

Baird Discusses Plans For Seniors' Housing

The minimum number of units in any one low-rental housing project for senior citizens of the province will be four, Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge, chairman of the Senior Citizens Housing Corporation board of directors, said yesterday.

At an organizational meeting of the corporation Tuesday night, Rev. Mark Ferguson, Summerside, was appointed vice-president, and Mrs. J. Neil Gordon, Charlottetown, was named

secretary-treasurer. Mr. Wedge said that the corporation will be built in Souris and Tignish. A survey of the need for this type of housing in both areas will be carried out.

Mr. Wedge said that later a survey of the province will be made and a map drawn up showing the number of pensioners in each electoral district. Housing will be provided on the basis of need, he said.

Units with self-contained apartments for elderly couples will be the first type of housing provided, the minister said. Later he added, "we will build a hostel type of accommodation for bachelors, spinsters, widowers and widows."

Mr. Wedge said that eventually the housing program will need a full-time director. He said that the corporation by-laws were approved. Housing regulations will be drawn up for consideration at an early meeting. Mr. Wedge said that at the next meeting it is hoped to have representatives of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation meet with the directors to discuss details of planning and financing the project.

The provincial government finances 10 per cent of construction costs, while the balance is shared by CMHC under the terms of the Housing Act. Mr. Wedge said that he hopes construction of the first unit will start in July.

(Continued from page 1) These talks, which started five months ago, are to be before a federal conciliation board early in July.

The agreement with the union came after what Mr. Wilson described as a "most intensive negotiations since May 17, two days after the union set the strike date.

Neither party gave details of the work - rules agreements, describing them as too technical to be easily explained.

The agreement followed the late low pay scale. The conciliation board report signed by the union representative, Liberal Senator Arthur Beacock of Toronto.

The majority report, signed by the chairman, Judge John B. Robinson of Halifax, N.S., and company nominee, Roy Meighen of Montreal, proposed a 6 1/2 per cent wage increase.

The union's increase will be paid on the basis of one per cent retroactive to June 1, 1961, with the previous contract expired, one per cent retroactive to Dec. 1, 1961; 1 1/2 per cent June 1, 1962; 2 1/2 per cent Dec. 1, 1962; and two per cent June 1, 1963.

The union, now earning an average of \$5,500 a year, had sought an 18 per cent increase over a two-year contract.

New Icebreaker Pondered For Borden Run Service

Recognition by the federal government of the need for a new ice-breaking ferry to carry auto and rail traffic across Northumberland Strait into the causeway to the mainland is completed, was announced yesterday afternoon by Hon. Gordon Balcer, federal minister of transport, in a public address in Evangeline High School at Abrams Village.

Mr. Balcer said that the matter of the new ferry for the Borden-Tormentine route was now under active consideration, and promised that action would be taken soon on the matter.

The minister of transport coupled his announcement with the announcement that a threatened CNR strike had been settled. Mr. Balcer emphasized that the government would take the necessary action to keep the car ferries running.

Khrushchev Sees ECM Threat To World Peace

MOSCOW (Reuters) - Soviet Premier Khrushchev Wednesday attacked the European Common Market as an "imperialist" agency which threatens "the cause of universal peace" and serves as an instrument for keeping liberated African countries in bondage.

The Russian leader coupled his attack with a recent spate of articles in the Soviet press indicating the Russian government's concern with the market.

Western diplomatic sources said the anti-market campaign appeared to be caused in part by the effect on Communist bloc foreign currency earnings as market tariff barriers rise and more countries join.

Khrushchev said Russia is ready to sign long-term trade agreements with African countries which would create a stable market for their manufactured goods.

France Planning Own Satellite

PARIS (Reuters) - France has set a date for launching its own space satellite, it was announced Wednesday.

Science Minister Gaston Palewski outlined plans for the satellite at a cabinet meeting and informed Minister Alain Peyrefitte later told reporters a secret launching date has been fixed "almost to the hour."

Usually well-informed scientific sources said it was originally planned to launch the satellite - code named Diamond - at the end of 1964 or early in 1965.

Siamese Twins Are Separated; Doctors Hopeful

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Tiny Patricia and Prudence Lowe, 11-month-old Siamese twins, were separated today at their first day apart and doctors at Children's Hospital were optimistic about their future.

New methods were used in a procedure Wednesday to separate the babies born April 11 joined from the breast bone to the spine.

They shared no common organs but had fused livers and diaphragms.

For the first time, plastic was used to cover the open chest.

Over the mesh was placed some 500,000 dried skin from the U.S. navy hospital skin bank. This will be replaced in three weeks or so with grafts from the twins' own bodies.
