HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Liberals Strengthening Hands of the Country's Enemies.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Mr. Chamberlain announced in the House of Commons yesterday, that Civil Government will probably be established in the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies.

Mr. Chamberlain said that the government hoped it was not prophecy that, very shortly, indeed, before the House met again something in the nature of civil administration might be established in both Orange River and the Transvaal. Sir Alfred Milner, he added, would be appointed Governor of both.

Here Duncan Pirie, Liberal member for North Aberdeen, a former Captain of the Aberdeenshire militia, who recently returned from South Africa where he went to look after the remount department when the war broke out, interrupted Mr. Chamberlain, saying: "You will lose South Africa."

Mr. Chamberlain proceeded without noticing the remark.

THE EAST QUEEN'S STEAL.

Opinions of the Press.

(Halifax Herald.)

The counting out of Mr. Martin, the Liberal-Conservative member-elect in East Queen's, Prince Edward Island, is one of the most remarkable cases in this era of remarkable election cases and election steals. It seems, according to our despatch, that the judge ruled that ballots that were clearly marked for the respective candidates, and hence unobjectionable so far as the electors could make them, should be thrown out and left uncounted because of a mistake or fraud of the deputy returning officer in placing numbers upon them. Why electors should be cheated of their votes because of the act of the deputy returning officer, does not appear. Yet it is by so doing according to this remarkable ruling in the recount that Mr. Martin has for the time been deprived of the seat to which the people by a clear majority elected him. If such a ruling as that is to stand as law, it will be entirely within the power of a deputy returning officer or two in each constituency to defeat the will of a majority of the people in every case.

(St John Sun.)

The unseating of Mr. Martin seems to be one of the most unfair things in our political records. Mr. Martin, who has the majority of votes, loses his seat through no default of himself or his agent, but by irregularities committed by an employe of the government, who was probably a nominee of the candidate now declared elected. The judge, who is also, we believe, an appointee of the Laurier government, has decided that more than half the ballots at one poll shall not be counted because the returning officer, appointed by the government, had made a mark on them. This officer by mistake numbered the ballots instead of the counterfoil when he gave them to the electors. When he found out that he had done wrong he tried to erase the marks. In some cases he succeeded so well that the judge saw his way clear to count the votes. In other cases the mark left was so plain that the ballots, some 80 in number, were rejected. The larger part of those rejected were for Martin, and so he lost the seat.

This is a remarkable result. Any officer has only to mark with discretion, or erase with discrimination, to elect either candidate. The electors have then nothing to do with the case. All depends upon the operations of the official and the eraser.

It is interesting to remember that this Mr. McKinnon is the same who became Attorney-General of the province in 1899, [was defeated in the following by-election, and yet sat as a minister in the government for more than a year without a seat in the House. Having held the office of Attorney-General without regard to his rejection by the people in the provincial election he may be expected to occupy a seat in the House of Commons without regard to his rejection by the people in a federal election.

Kruger Feels Tired.

QUEBEC ELECTIONS.

Conservatives Secure Only Eight Seats.

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—The event in yesterday's election in this city was the defeat of Hon. A. W. Atwater, Ex-Provincial Treasurer, in the St. Lawrence division by James Cochran.

The Conservatives ascribe Mr. Atwater's defeat to the fact that the voters did not go to the poll. Mr. Atwater will lose his deposit.

Dr. Levolette, the Conservative candidate in St. Mary's, also loses his deposit.

The election returns from all over the Province show that the Conservatives carried only eight constituencies.

The Liberals now hold sixty-three seats and the Conservatives eight. There are still three elections to be held.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

DeWet Hard Pressed by General Knox.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—A despatch from Lord Kitchener, dated Bloemfontein, December 7th, confirms the report that DeWet's main force is hard pressed and adds that General Knox captured a Krupp gun which DeWet had abandoned near the Caledon river and continued in pursuit of DeWet.

The despatch also says that while the British were handing over the women at the request of the Boers, under a flag of truce, at Belfast, December 3rd, a force of one hundred Boers unsuccessfully attacked the neighboring infantry post.

CANADIANS IN LONDON.

They Will Sail for Home on Tuesday Next.
