Exhilarating Fluid.

The *Summerside Farmer* gives the result of an analysis of a sample of hop beer alias "schenk" or sheek bought recently by a member of the Prince County Temperance League, from the proprietor of one of the hop beer shops in Summerside. This sample was sent to W. F. Best, analytical chemist, St. John, N. B., by a most reliable gentleman, and the following was received and read at the weekly meeting of the League, on Friday evening, 21st inst:—

DEAR SIR.—This is to certify that I have examined the sample of so-called "Schenk" Beer and find it to contain 4.35 per cent. of alcohol.

The *Farmer* says: "Many persons are of the opinion that much of the hop beer sold in this country has been diluted and adulterated as described in the *Encyclopedia Britannica* by Mr. Philips, a commissioner of inland revenue in England. He says there was a class of adulterations much practiced in that country, especially by brewers who retailed their own beer, where he found that they frequently used tobacco and "cocculus indicus," and he even thinks that the cases of brutal and purposeless violence, which were so often recorded, were referable to the maddening influence of these ingredients. By the Licensing Act, 1872, provision is made in England to protect the public from the adulterations of beer, for it prohibits the possession, sale, or use of beer adulterated with "cocculus indicus," salt, copperas, opium, Indian hemp, strychnine, tobacco, dandel seed, extract of logwood, salts of zinc or lead, alum and any extract or compound thereof, under a penalty of £100. The police and officers of Inland Revenue are empowered to search for and obtain samples of such beer, and a skilled chemist is appointed as analyst to test the samples. Many think the police of Summerside should be empowered to do the same here, so that more samples might be tested to find the amount of alcohol and also the adulterations of the beverages sold in Summerside, in order that not only the witnesses but also the Magistrates may learn the true state of affairs, instead of groping hopelessly in the dark as they have been doing in the past.

"In England the amount of alcohol in beer, ale and porter, is said to range from 5 to 7 per cent.

"So the Summerside 'Schenk' or hop beer reported above as having 4.35 per cent. of alcohol having been exposed in a decanter for half an hour before being bottled for transport to St. John, N. B. must have contained on an average an amount of alcohol equal to English ale, which ought to decide the matter for all intelligent persons that the selling of such is a violation of the Scott Act."

Business generally appears to be prospering in the hands of Messrs. McLean and Cameron and O. B.
