Local and Other Items.

CITY COUNCIL.—The regular monthly meeting of the City Council will be held tonight. This will be the last meeting before the election.

SIGNS OF SPRING.—The weather continues to be unusually mild. The small boys have begun to play marbles on the sidewalk; and some of the boys at the eastern end of the city are going about bare-footed.

SPECIAL FARES.—By the kindness of Superintendent Sharp arrangements have been made for single fare return from any point on the P. E. I. R., to the patriotic concert on the 22nd inst. Passengers will pay fare coming and return on certificate of attendance at concert.

BOARD OF TRADE.—A meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held this forenoon. The secretary was instructed to write to the Minister of Marine urging the importance of having either the Minto or the Stanley placed upon the Charlottetown-Pictou route as soon as possible, and not later than the 1st of March. The secretary was also instructed to communicate with our representatives at Ottawa with regard to the stamping of canned goods. The selecting of a meeting room was left in the hands of a committee. The matter of freight rates was also considered.

AMERICAN AND CANADIAN NURSES.—There is war in the Peekskill hospital between the American and Canadian nurses. Miss Genoa T. Jackson, a Canadian, has been at the head of the training school for nurses in the institution and many Canadian girls became her pupils. The South African war has caused trouble between the American girls and the girls across the border over pictures of British officers and American officers posted on the walls. Much trouble comes from the fact that the Canadian nurses charged Dr. Perley H. Mason, coroner of the county with saying that they were incompetent. The matter is before the medical board and it is said the physicians will uphold Dr. Mason, who has denied making the charges against the Canadian nurses.

—Mr. Martin is looking for light concerning the extraordinary proceedings of the Dominion Government while the Provincial bye-elections were in progress here. He has given notice that he will move for an order of the House for copies of specifications, plans, tenders received and contract entered into by the Government relating to the construction of ten miles of railway, known as the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway, in the Province of Prince Edward Island. No doubt the matter will be ventilated. Mr. Martin or some other member of Parliament, will probably, ere long, try to bring to light the facts concerning the alleged agreement between the co-operating governments as to the bridge across the Hillsborough.

A Frenchman Finds Canadian Weather Had a Bad Effect on His Health.

St. ESTACHE, Que., Feb. 12.—Auguste Dubois landed here from France, a perfect stranger to the weather conditions prevailing in this country. Mr. Barry was born in Newfoundland 76 years ago and came here when 6 years old where he remained till his death. He was an intelligent man and a good farmer. His remains are interred in the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Morrell Rear. He leaves one son and three daughters to mourn the loss of a kind parent.

CHARLOTTETOWN TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.—A thoroughly enjoyable and profitable hour was spent by the city teachers at their regular fortnightly meeting in the Y. M. C. A. parlor on Saturday evening. In the meetings this season the Association is reading and discussing "Landon's School Management," an educational standard. The section at present being discussed is that pertaining to discipline and moral training. In Saturday night's meeting the portion read related to the effect of example upon the child.
