Canada Well Informed On Russian Air Might

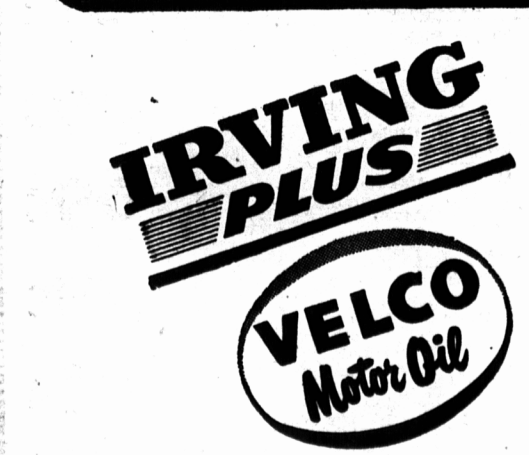

 OTTAWA (CP)—Canada is keeping well abreast of the latest information on Russian air developments, officials said Monday.
 Canadian air defence policy, they added, is based on information concerning improvements in the Russian air force.
 Officials here were commenting on the air force day show in Moscow Sunday at which new super-

sonic jet fighters were unveiled.
 Canadian defence planners are particularly interested in any advances in Russian jet bombers. The Red air force now is reported to have intercontinental bombers comparable to the American B-52.
 It is Russian long-range bombers which RCAF jet fighter planes would have to contend with in the event of attack on North America.
 Canada's main defence weapon now is the CF-100 jet interceptor,

developed at a cost of \$122,000,000. Nine squadrons are to be completely equipped with CF-100s by the end of this year. That comes to about 300 planes.
 "We have been anticipating for quite a while that the CF-100 is not good enough for the future," one official said.
 For this reason, a \$100,000,000 program has been launched for design and production of the CF-105, a supersonic, delta-winged jet interceptor.
 Whether the CF-100 would be a match for the latest Russian bombers can only be speculated on. It will take about six years before the supersonic CF-105 is in production.

Last year at this time, officials admitted that development of Russian bombers had come as a nasty shock. One authority said Russia had been underestimated in this field.
 Most of Canada's sources of information on Russian air developments are in allied countries, though there are Canadian military attaches in Moscow.
 "But the Moscow air show, the Russians are going out of their way to tell the West about their air power, officials commented.
 This was an indication that the Russians are warning the West that it would be dangerous to start a war. This has been the policy of the West toward the Russians.
