MR. FARQUHARSON'S LETTER.

We print elsewhere Premier Farquharson's letter. The letter contains a very different statement from that made by the Premier at Hunter River, and seems to give evidence that in various matters his mind changes from time to time. He now denies the right of Sir Louis Davies to have interfered in regard to the succession to the seat, but he seems to have according to his own statement consulted with him a good deal. He first told Sir Louis that he would not be a candidate, then, wrote him from Point du Chene two days later, withdrawing what he had told Sir Louis, and later he wired Sir Louis on the subject confirming his letter, but still did not decide to be a candidate till 13th June, after Mr. Hassard had formally withdrawn his previously offered support. So many fluctuations of mind are apparent in the Premier's own story that people may be left to guess what his mind will be tomorrow on any subject.

It is intimated that the two candidates now before the people in West Queen's will be asked to define their attitude with regard to federal and provincial prohibition respectively.

Postage on letters to England is two cents for a half ounce. Many Canadian correspondents, it appears, exceed this weight, with the result that the persons receiving their letters have to pay double for the deficiency. That is, on a letter say of three-quarters of an ounce in weight, sent from Charlottetown to London and prepaid with a two-cent stamp, the London recipient would be required to pay two pence, or four cents on receiving the letter. Correspondents who send letters across the Atlantic should bear these facts in mind.

There are now ten vacancies in the House of Commons. Four of these are in Quebec, three are in Ontario, one in New Brunswick, one in Prince Edward Island and one in Manitoba. Seven of these seats were held by supporters of the Laurier Government. In Quebec there were four supporters appointed to office. In New Brunswick Mr. Gibson was unseated, in P. E. Island Sir Louis Davies was appointed to a Judgeship and in Kingston Ont. Mr. Britton was also made a Judge. The three seats now vacant which were before held by Opposition members are Lisgar, Man. where Mr. Richardson was unseated, Addington, Ont. where Mr. Bell died and West Hastings, Ont. where Mr. Corby resigned.

A Light Patron's Views

SIR.—The notice of increase in the charges for lighting, recently issued by the Charlottetown Light and Power Co., is something the tax-payers and users of light in Charlottetown should not pass over too quickly—perhaps a remedy may be found.

The present capital of the Light and Power Co., is \$75,000. \$58,000 of this is in the two Electric Light plants, and \$19,000 is put down as the value of the Gas plant. What does the first \$58,000 represent? Largely a lot of antiquated, worn-out, out-of-date plant, producing poor light, expensive to keep in any kind of running order, and using two pounds of coal when one would do the work.

Modern and up-to-date electric light plants are equipped with boilers fitted with self stoking, all smoke consuming furnaces, triple cross compound surface condensing engines, with dynamo placed directly on the main shaft of engines. All belts, line shafting and counter shafts are done away with, and what is the result? A reduction of one half in the coal account, of two thirds in the cost of fireman's wages, and one half in the cost of station help.

Let private enterprise take the matter up, or better still the City itself spend \$40,000 in a plant. Put in three first class boilers, two modern up to date current producing engines, and a first class light at prices anybody will be willing to pay will be the result. Don't blame the P. Co. they are saddled with a lot of old stuff, they have to steam five boilers, run five engines and upwards of a dozen dynamos when two of each would be sufficient. They have three secretaries and three sets of directors and managers, etc. to pay, and they have to earn a dividend on \$75,000 yearly. They have an uphill task and deserve pity rather than condemnation.

The president of a Montreal Lighting Co. recently pleaded the extra cost of fuel as the only reason for raising Montreal City \$300 per lamp for street lighting yet on the starting of a new Co. this same president put his name to a contract to light the same city of Montreal for \$300 per lamp.

What we want in Charlottetown, is the competition of a modern up to date Electric Plant—then rates will be reasonable.
