

Judge Denies Contempt Try

(NEW YORK (AP)) — Federal Judge Sidney Sugarman Tuesday denied a motion by the United States Securities and Exchange Commission to cite Canadian financier Robert Maurice Sherwood for criminal contempt in selling stock of the Canadian Javelin, Ltd., mining firm in the U.S. without registering it with the SEC.

The commission had claimed when it entered its motion last March that Sherwood had concealed in November, 1958, to a decree signed by Judge Sugarman which permanently enjoined him from selling common shares of Javelin in the U.S. in violation of the registration provisions of the U.S. Securities Act of 1933. The SEC contended that Sherwood shortly afterward had sold more than 8,000 shares of Javelin in the U.S. for about \$125,000.

Sherwood's counsel contended—and Judge Sugarman agreed in his decision Tuesday—that the stock sold here by Sherwood was not registrable, and that the Canadian had not intentionally violated the judge's decree.

The judge held that at the time of the sales Sherwood was not a "control person" in the company, and thus did not come under the registration provisions.

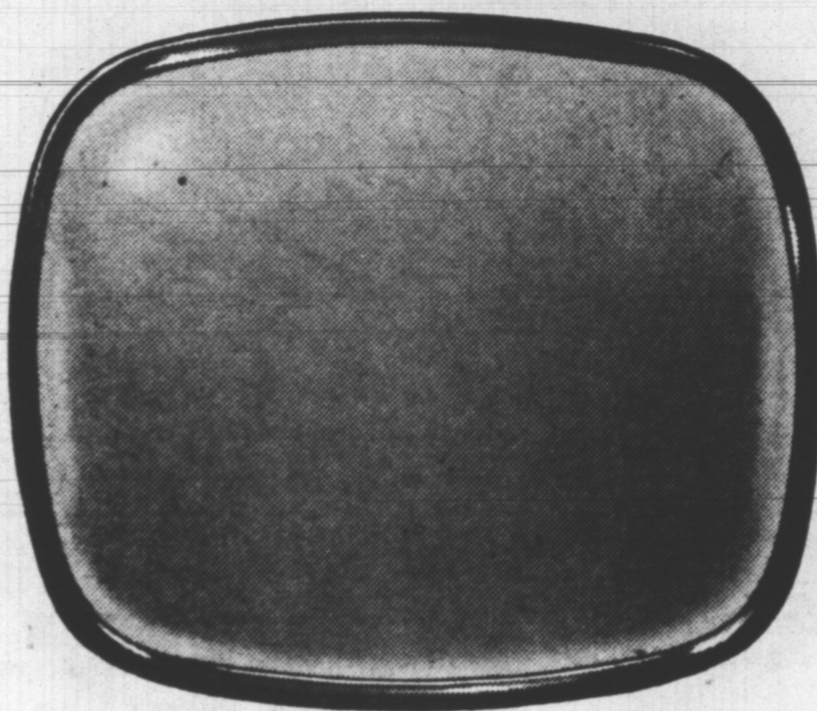
BUILDING SHAKEN

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — An earthquake shook parts of Georgia and South Carolina early Monday. No injuries or serious damage were reported.

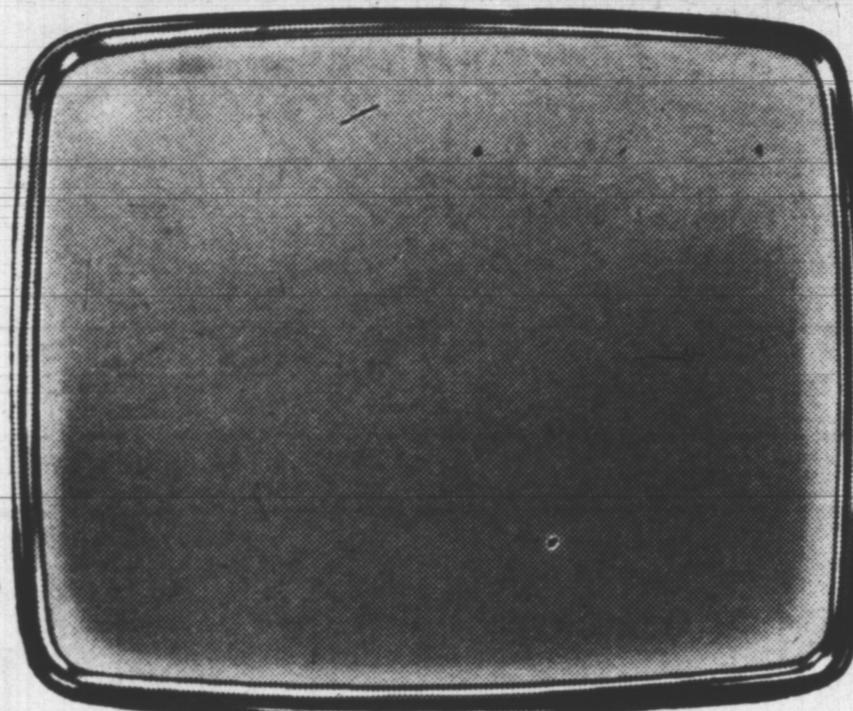
