### Prince Co. Employment Prospects Said Better

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE PATRIOT — The peak employment period this winter in Prince County is forecast to be slightly higher than last year, stated Earl Cannon, manager of the Summerside Unemployment Insurance Commission.

However, this is offset somewhat, he added, by the fact that although there will be more employment, there will also be more unemployed than last year due to the increased labor force.

This increase has been due to two reasons: (1) fewer people left the area this past year; (2) many came back from other provinces where they were employed.

Mr. Cannon said that employment opportunities were better locally and not so good in some other areas of Canada, resulting in the return of many people and adding to the general labor force.

There has also been a larger exodus from the farms to the town this year than ever before, he stated.

Mr. Cannon's forecast is based partly on the fact that Summerside and vicinity is enjoying a boom construction year and much of this work will continue into the winter. How far into the winter depends of course on the weatherman. Several construction projects had intended to continue work throughout last winter but had to shut down because of an intense cold period that struck the province in January.

### Veteran Poultry Chief, P.E.I. Native, Is Retiring

A.F. Curran, 66, one of the pioneers of Canada's poultry industry, has retired as chief of the inspection and grading section, Poultry Products Division, Canada Dept. of Agriculture.

He will remain with the division for three months to complete amendments to various marketing regulations.

Succeeding him is Hugh Cochran, 62, associate chief since 1954.

Born at East Royalty, Prince Edward Island, Mr. Curran graduated from St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, and worked in a law office two years before joining the poultry division in 1915. He was transferred to New Brunswick for two years and in 1922 was made senior poultry promoter in Nova Scotia. He was district poultry products inspector for Ontario from 1938 until being appointed chief of the inspection and grading section five years ago.

FROM START

Mr. Curran was one of a small group who laid the foundation of the nation's poultry industry, mapping out principles that are followed today. Early in his career, he visited individual farms and traveled with egg collectors in an effort to raise the standard of quality. He has been associated with the industry from "the days of the setting hen" to automation.

In Ontario, he instituted registered egg grading stations and later guided their expansion across the country.

Mr. Cochran was born in Paisley, Scotland, coming to Canada in 1921. He joined the poultry division at Winnipeg in 1925.

From 1944 to 1949, he was in England representing the Special Products Board on shipments to the British Ministry of Food of poultry products—egg powder, shell eggs, frozen egg products and dress powder.

Mr. Cochran was appointed district inspector for Saskatchewan in 1949 and was transferred to Winnipeg as district inspector for Manitoba in 1957. He came to Ottawa as associate chief of inspection and grading in 1954.
