CONSTANTINOPLE, August 27.—The Turkish ambassador at Vienna, Mahmud Nedim Bay, telegraphs that a number of persons are coming to Constantinople for the purpose of causing bomb explosions. It is announced that there are eleven Armenians concerned in the bomb outrages here. Of this number one man has committed suicide, and eight men have been arrested.

**WATCH AND CHAIN PRESENTED**

A handsome gold watch and chain was on Saturday presented to Mr. Edward J. Duffy, foreman stone-cutter on the new Roman Catholic Cathedral. The presentation was accompanied by the following address:

To Mr. Edward J. Duffy, Foreman:

**PRACTICAL JOKERS DISTURB WORSHIP.**

The congregation was face to face with a tragedy. And up stairs, the way to which was traced in gore, lay the dead body of a man in sailor attire. The doctor was summoned, the senior Magistrate, R. B. Reid, called upon the scene and everything put in readiness to face a serious crisis in the history of the smart little western town. It was only when the supposed body was turned over, the head having been stuck in between the plastering of the attic wall, that the serious faces of the murder-believers were in some cases suffused with smiles, and in others with indignation and anger. A stuffed figure was all that was there—sea boots, pants, jacket and all! The gore below stairs was produced from an unlucky cat which fell into evil hands, and the shots and cries a part of the programme adopted by the practical jokers. The congregation, many of whom hurried home with thoughts of the red-handed murderer secreted in their dwellings, and filled with all sorts of horrors, is now very anxious to find out who could so cold-bloodedly traffic with its feelings, and the fee-seeking quire and doctor do not relish the job put upon them either. There is trouble ahead.

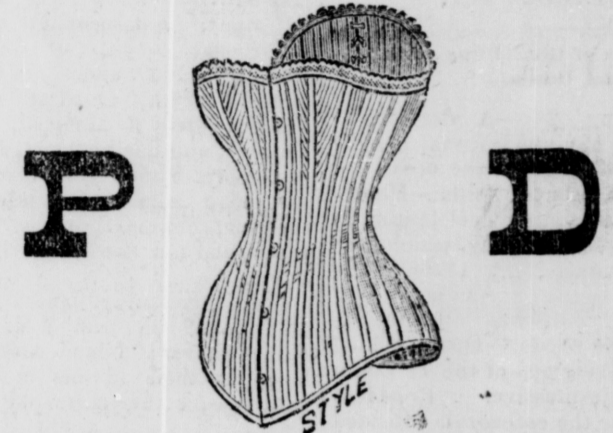
