GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE

Friendly Settlement Anticipated

British Interests Will Not be Sacrificed.

THE CABINET AND COUNTRY A UNIT.

Chamberlain's African Scheme.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Chamberlain said that he expected a friendly and satisfactory settlement of the French West-Africa difficulty. Mr. Chamberlain asserted that the cabinet was united in its African policy. He believed that the country also, as united and that while ready to make concessions for sake of maintaining peaceful relations with foreign powers, the country would not allow important British interests to be sacrificed.

The paper and all parties concerned raise a chorus of approval over Chamberlain's scheme which begins with the conversion of Rhodesia into a Crown Colony. The arrangement is regarded as reassuring for the Transvaal, since the British government is now responsible for any attack upon the Transvaal. The scheme does not affect northern Rhodesia which is left for further consideration.

Mr. Perry's Funeral.

Remains are on the Way Home.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—The remains of S. F. Perry, M. P., were despatched by the train to Prince Edward Island last evening in charge of his son.

In the funeral procession to the station were Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Louis Davies and other Maritime members of parliament. The flag flew at half mast on the Parliament building.

M. Zola Will Appeal.

PARIS, Feb. 25.—M. Zola will appeal from the sentence that has been imposed upon him.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—Six armoured vessels, six protected cruisers, thirteen torpedo boat destroyers and five torpedo boats are now building in Great Britain for foreign governments, of which a number are purchasable, although Japan is supposed to have the option on several of them. Those war ships which have been ordered for South American governments are considered as being for sale to the highest bidder. Thomson Bros. say that Spain has arranged to man the two remaining destroyers of the four completed some time ago at the Clyde bank yards, but they were not delivered, presumably for lack of payment.

power, consider any such suggestion or any compromise in Cuba beyond the broad measure of autonomy drafted by the liberal government. This is an absolute, irrevocable decision. People who suggest anything else are only wasting time and arousing unfounded hopes.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—In reply to a telegram of enquiry to Hamilton Smith, who is at present in New York, regarding his offer to the government, the following message was received from Smith: "Van Horne, at my request, approached Sifton the day after the latter's return from the west, showing my plan and naming most of my London associates, and indicating my desire to build a line by the Dalton route."

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—A good deal of interest is felt here in the arrangement understood to have been made concerning the Manitoba schools. Archbishop Langevin, of St. Boniface, was here last week and so was Dr. Duce, representing the advisory board of Manitoba, and one at least of the French school inspectors. It is expected that as a result of this conference the separate schools of Winnipeg will become public schools on the same conditions as the Catholic schools at St. John and Halifax. There was also a discussion about text-books and about the use of the French language in schools where French is spoken by most of the people. The common impression here is that a modus vivendi will be established in accord with the advice of the encyclical, which is that Roman Catholics in this country should not refuse concessions while struggling for what they believe their full rights.

YUKON RAILWAY CONTRACT

(Montreal Star.)

Nothing is more certain than that, if this contract passes as it stands, and if the railway falls as an all-Canadian route because of American interference at Fort Wrangel, and if the land grant turns out as seems very probable to be altogether out of proportion to the work done, the country will simply be furious at the men who bound them down to so helpless a captivity to the American masters at Fort Wrangel, who gave away half the gold lands of the Yukon for a foreseen failure, and who made the Klondike for commercial purposes anything but a part of Canada.

The trade of the Yukon will be for the next few years the first business prize of the world. Proper management will secure the prize for Canadians. When we remember the advantages under which we start, it will be truer to say that nothing but flagrantly improper management can give that prize to any one else. The wealth of the Yukon is within the boundaries of Canada; and, while we propose to admit freely the prospectors of the world, we propose to keep the business of feeding and clothing them for our own people.

If we are balked in this through the stupidity of the Government, no blanching or campaign fund can save the guilty parties from the just anger of the people. Such an opportunity can hardly come to any nation twice, and it comes, indeed, to few nations at all; and to lose it through the fault of the very men we pay to look after our interests, would be more than flesh and blood could stand—even party flesh and blood.

Hence we candidly advise the members who think of taking the responsibility of passing this contract through Parliament to go first to their constituents, see that they fully understand the real facts of the case—the risk, the price, the kind of road, the effects of the monopoly clauses in case the Americans can do all they claim at Fort Wrangel, and then ask the constituents to assume the responsibility of advising their member how to vote. This will at least divide somewhat the responsibility. The member cannot, of course, escape bearing the giant share. It is his business to know this scheme through and through. He is at Ottawa, and should give his whole time up to study of it—a thing few of his constituents would be able to do.

But the common instinct of self-preservation should lead him to require of the Government plenty of time to get what opinion his supporters at home may be able to form on the matter before he stands up to be counted in the House of Commons.

John E. Welsh, aged 16, became lost in the woods in the neighborhood of his home at Economy, N. S., recently, and was frozen to death.

Archdeacon Phair, who has spent many years in the remote Northwest, as a missionary for the Church of England, states that intending Klondikers who think of taking dogs with them are making a very serious mistake. Mr. Phair says that the "hukies," or Esquimaux dogs, are well protected with a growth of hair between their toes, which prevents their feet from being frozen. Imported dogs have not this necessary pedal-extremity protection and every dog taken into the Klondike during this winter is sure to suffer, and be rendered quite useless. Of course, if the dogs are taken in during the spring they have a chance of becoming acclimatized before cold weather sets in and may live through the winter.

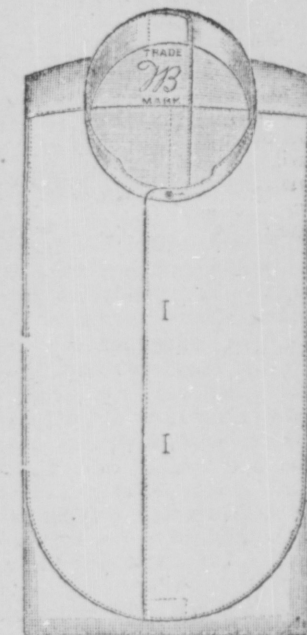
