BRILLIANT FUNCTION

Emperor William Confers Decorations Upon Distinguished Men.

BERLIN, Jan. 15.—Today being coronation and decoration day, the first day in the carnival week in the Prussian court, Emperor William held a Chamber of the Knights of the Order of the Crown, including all upon whom decorations were conferred last year and others of today's conferring.

The function took place at the Schloss and was attended by Empress Auguste Victoria and all the members of the imperial family, with the ministers of state, the foreign envoys and many high officers. The company was unusually large and the festival one of unswerving brilliancy.

Among the newly decorated are Colonel Schwarzkoppen, former military attaché at the German embassy in Paris, who has frequently been mentioned in connection with the Dreyfus case; M. Bertillon, inventor of the Bertillon system of measuring criminals, and Prof. Von Zim of Königsberg, university, the upholder of the claims of the Schaumburg house to the Lippe-Deimold inheritance.

RUSSIA'S BIG BUDGET

A Remarkably Large Appropriation For Railways

LONDON, Jan 17.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says: The Russian budget for 1899, like its predecessor, is remarkable for enormous expenditure on railways. It is an outlay of 98,000,000 roubles (\$76,239,000) and is a glaring proof of Russia's unparalleled efforts to extend her railway system, a system almost entirely due to the practical railway experience of her two remarkable ministers, M. Dewite, Minister of Finance, who rose to power through railway management at home, and Prince Michael Khilkoff, who, as he once jokingly remarked, began life as a blacksmith and fitter in an American railway depot. Prince Khilkoff's share in the expenditure is far greater than that of any other imperial minister, exceeding the war minister credit by 37,000,000 roubles. In this respect the budget, which amounts to 397,000,000 roubles (\$305,690,000), and is put forward on the eve of the disarmament conference is a peaceful budget.

FOR WORLD'S PEACE.

LONDON, Jan 16.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times, who confirms Friday's statement by the Vienna correspondent of the Standard as to the issuance of a circular from St. Petersburg to the powers embodying a programme to be considered at the proposed conference on the limitation of armaments, asserts that the suggested basis of discussion are given with great detail. He cites, for example, the prohibition of employment of new inventions, of the use of explosive, submarine vessels and the practice of ramming vessels. The programme also proposes, he says, a discussion of the avoidance of war by recourse to arbitration wherever possible.

The Offset of British Diplomacy

LONDON, Jan 15.—The government of the Transvaal, says the Pretoria correspondent of the Times, has expended nearly £800,000 since 1894 in trying to influence the European press and European officials to prevent the leasing of Delagoa Bay to Great Britain.

A DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.—A workman near Ottawa who practices familiarity in his social intercourse with dynamite, has narrowly escaped annihilation. He is David Donovan, of Canby, foreman of the Nellie Mica Mine. He was fixing the fire. There were five sticks of dynamite in his pocket, and a spark from the stove flew in among them. Mr. Donovan stripped off his coat and ran from the house. His wife and infant child were picked out of the ruins of their home unhurt. They had been upstairs when the spark found the dynamite in the room below. Their escape from death is almost incredible.

IRELAND IS AGGRIEVED.

Demands an Adjustment of Financial Relations with England.

LONDON, January 16.—The Irish movement for securing a readjustment of the financial relations between that kingdom and Great Britain is evidently gaining strength. Last year, Belfast, the commercial capital of Ireland declined to adopt the prevalent theory that Ireland's contribution to the imperial exchequer was greater than it ought to be, but now the "All Ireland committee" have captured the corporation of Belfast, and that body, against the advice of Alderman Sir James Halett, M. P., and Alderman Pirrie, by 17 votes to 7, has declared its opinion that the financial relations "demand the immediate consideration of her majesty's government with a view to taking such action in relation thereto as the justice of the case demands."
