Monument Discussed At Georgetown

At a Citizen's meeting held in the Town Hall on Monday evening, March 30th, it was unanimously decided that the present Cairn, which commemorates the war dead, should be removed and replaced with a more suitable monument.

Rev. W. A. Paterson acted as meeting chairman and Mr. J. B. Scully as meeting secretary. In attendance were Mayor, Andrew MacNeill, Rev. O. Kiggins, Ex-Mayor P. L. Boudreaux, members of the Town Council, Canadian Legion, Ladies Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion and Citizens. All present took part in the discussion which ensued.

It was the opinion of all that due to the deteriorating condition of the present Cairn, that it would be wise to replace it. A committee of Mayor, Andrew MacNeill and Mr. J. B. Scully was appointed to correspond with National Historic Sites and Monument Committee in an attempt to obtain information regarding monument design, relative cost and the material best suited to Maritime weather, be it granite or cement.

The question of utilizing the present base was also discussed, as well as the matter of a new plaque, to contain the names of fallen soldiers in the 1939-45 war. It was also suggested that one plaque might be obtained on which the

Return From Enjoyable Trip To Southern U.S.

Mrs. L. H. Poole and Mrs. J. P. Beer returned to Montague this week from a six weeks vacation to Southern United States. The main part of their visit was spent in Miami, Florida, the magic city. They also visited Miami Beach, Fort Lauderdale, Palm Beach, Coral Gables, and other cities along the eastern coast. Among the attractions which they attended were horse races at Gulf Stream and dog races at Hollywood race track. They also visited the Orange Bowl, the scene of many New Years Day football games.

The highlight of the trip was the visit to Cuba, arriving there of the S.S. Florida. They were taken on a tour of the old and the new Havana, a tour of the capital building visiting the official rooms, the reception room, the senate room, and the diplomatic room. In the main corridor of this historic building is a 44-carat diamond ring, has trod the feet of many eminent statesmen.

They also visited a cigar factory where they saw cigars being made by hand.

The Lady of Mercy Church with its magnificent life-like paintings, its coral room with Lady of Mercy coral statue in centre, was also a point of interest. They also visited Ponce de Leon building, Columbus Memorial Square, the old slave market, and the People's Cemetery.

In the alligator factory which they visited they obtained first hand knowledge on how ladies carrying bags were made. The El Moro Castle built 300 years ago as a fort against the English and Americans, and which still contains the old torture chambers which were abolished in 1929, proved another source of much interest. A visit to Key West proved interesting where they saw the series of islands connected by bridges, one of which is seven miles long, a modern engineering feat.

Following a visit to the east coast to St. Petersburg and Tampa, they flew to Washington, where they visited the Pentagon building, and were shown throughout the entire hub around and in which flows U.S. diplomacy. They returned home by way of New York.

While in Florida they met Captain and Mrs. Vernon Pearson, Captain Pearson, a retired deep sea captain, and formerly of Montague, is one of our successful Islanders abroad. In Washington they were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kyle, and of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hanscom in Boston.

Maj. McDonald In Budget Debate

That greater emphasis should be given to getting more pupils into the teaching profession and keeping them there, was stressed by Mr. John A. MacDonald, "Third Kings" when he spoke in the Legislature this week.

He noted that only seven entered the male teaching training course last year and said the need for good male teachers was particularly serious. He congratulated Montague on erecting a fine new school this year with Government assistance. He also asked again for a new Montague Bridge.

Dealing briefly with roads he requested the paving of the road from Cardigan to Dundas this year and suggested a coating chip be put on the stretch of road from Cherry Valley Corner to Montague. Immediate extension of the su-grading through Martindale from Greenfield to Summerville and from Cardigan Head to Baldwin's Road and into Lorne Valley. He agreed with several speakers on the necessity of widening the road from Dundas to the Plowing Match Grounds and that a short piece of the road from Cardigan to St. George's Road be subgraded.

The member from Cardigan stated he had been approached by credit unions in his area asking for a return to the \$4,500 grant originally given. The amount is small and the work of the unions is great.

The tables were tastefully arranged and decorated for the occasion.

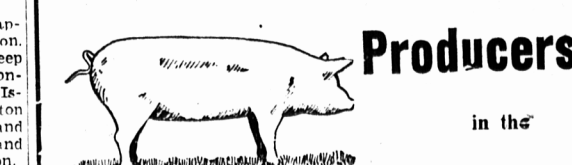
