



Large Attendance At Observance 91st Anniversary Of Church

New Dominion United Church held its 91st anniversary Sunday evening, Oct. 18. There was a large attendance of people of the church and also of many friends from the community and vicinity.

An interesting paper was read by Mrs. Allison MacMillan covering the history of the church from the date of its incorporation in 1862, and mentioning the names of many of the earlier settlers who helped establish the church. Exact information concerning a church building older than the present structure is not

available, but some older people can recall some facts about it and that it stood near the farm now owned by Mr. Hector MacLean.

Appreciative reference was made in the paper to gifts made at different times to the church and dedicated to the service of God. This resume of the church's history is very valuable and should be preserved carefully for the future.

Greatly appreciated greetings were received from former pastors of the charge including Reverends W. J. MacLeod, E. M. Atkinson, C. U. MacNevin, D. K. Ross, E. R. Woodside, J. R. Skinner and M. K. Charman. Rev. Geo. Tilley who has frequently preached in the church also sent a friendly letter. These were read to the congregation by Mr. W. R. Shaw.

Mrs. W. J. Mutch and Mrs. Jack MacRae of Cherry Valley, were guest singers and their beautiful music greatly enriched the service. A mixed quartet of the church consisting of Miss Shirley MacDonald, Mrs. Arthur MacDonald, Mr. George MacPhee and Mr. Walter Shaw, with Mrs. Hector Currie as accompanist, sang most acceptably. The choir, assisted by neighbouring singers, gave fine leadership to the service of praise.

The church building is in excellent repair and was recently painted on the exterior. Inside it is well lighted with electricity and is well kept and attractive throughout.

The minister, Rev. A. S. Weir, expressed the gratitude of the church to all who assisted with the program and welcomed the many visitors. He also spoke appreciatively of the past work of the church as noted in the historical sketch to which they had listened so attentively, and he reminded the congregation who now are responsible for the work, that while they review with justifiable pride the work of the past, the task now is to make that past an inspiration and challenge for the future.

CARRIER UNDAMAGED
PORT SAID, Egypt (Reuters)—The British aircraft carrier Unicorn left here for Britain Sunday apparently undamaged after running around in the Suez canal Saturday. She was dragged clear by tugs in a 5½-hour battle which caused a minor traffic hold-up in the waterway.

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
