Angus Alexander MacPherson, a resident of Framingham for the past six years, died early this morning at the Framingham Union Hospital after a brief illness. He was employed by the town of Framingham Public Works Department.

Mr. MacPherson was born on Prince Edward Island, on Dec. 24th, 1893, the son of the late Peter and Florence (MacLean) MacPherson. Remembrance Day At Georgetown

Remembrance Day was fittingly observed at Georgetown on Saturday, Nov. 11. Under sunny skies, an exceptionally large crowd of veterans, citizens and school children turned out to make this year's observance of this day of remembrance one of the most successful one, held here.

The members of the Cardigan Branch of the Canadian Legion also attended the ceremony, along with many veterans from points in the Georgetown area.

Hon. Joseph Campbell of Poplar Point, member without portfolio in the Provincial Government laid the Provincial Government wreath and was the guest speaker. The parade formed up at the Town Hall, under parade marshal Comrade Lawrence S. Batchelder and moved to the Cenotaph in the following order: Parade Marshal L. S. Batchelder, Standard Bearer James Publicover, president of the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, J. W. Lavers; veterans of the two World Wars, Mayor P. L. Boudreau and members of Town Council, Hon. Joseph Campbell, Government representative; the clergy; pupils of Georgetown High School and citizens.

At the Cenotaph the ceremony opened with "O Canada" by the school pupils; the observance of two minutes silence, which was broken by the reciting of the lines "They shall grow not old", by Miss Annie Keenan. Rev. S. J. Boyce then delivered the prayer and the wreaths were laid in the following order: The Provincial Government wreath by Hon. Joseph Campbell, the Town of Georgetown by His Worship Mayor P. L. Boudreau; the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Legion by branch president, J. W. Lavers; the Cardigan Branch of the Canadian Legion by Comrade Francis Shephard; next-of-kin of departed veterans and citizens.

The parade then returned to the Town Hall, where under the chairmanship of president J. W. Lavers the following programme was carried out: The hymn "O God Our Help In Ages Past"; opening remarks by His Worship Mayor P. L. Boudreau, followed by remarks by Rev. O. Kiggins, Rev. S. J. Boyce, Major J. A. MacDonald of Cardigan and Hon. Joseph Campbell, the guest speaker. The chairman then called on Comrade James H. Skinner of Bridgetown and former Georgetownian, a veteran of World War I, who has been actively connected with Remembrance Day proceedings in Georgetown since 1918 to the present. Captain J. B. Scully, Mr. J. A. B. MacConnell and Mr. J. Howard MacDonald followed with remarks appropriate for the occasion. All speakers referred to the great sacrifices made by those who served in both wars and in spite of those sacrifices the present danger of a third world war. Also stressed was the need for faith in God and the practicing of religious principles as the basis of life and providing a world brotherhood of man, which would prevent the outbreak of future wars.

In his closing remarks the chairman thanked all those who attended and also who supported the wreath and poppy campaign. He also spoke of the absence of the first war veteran Allister H. Stewart, who is a patient in the Prince

Montague Church Hall To Open Soon

The interesting project on which the congregation of Trinity Church, Montague has been engaged during the summer and fall months is drawing to completion so that the opening service in the new church hall, which was that project, will be held this Sunday afternoon, Nov. 19th at 3 o'clock. Some finishing touches will be still required because of difficulty in always securing materials in time.

Last year Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, who, although retired, is still active, was invited to serve the congregation, and when he was asked to promise another year's service he made it a condition that the church building be enlarged to give better facilities for work. The challenge was accepted and about a year ago when the first supper of the newly organized Men's Club was held the strategic time to begin action had come. It was hard to get sitting accommodation for the men; and the ladies found their serving facilities inadequate. A partnership of enthusiasm came into being; and plans were laid. At a meeting of the Men's Club a call for subscriptions was heard and the farmers have provided from their own woods all the rough lumber required. Also a considerable amount of voluntary labor helped on the good work. The result is a hall that is beautiful inside as well as adaptable to many uses. It will house the Sunday School, it is equipped for basketball and other facilities for physical training. It will help train in religion and in the application of religious life, both at work and play. It is interesting that the first public service rendered by the hall was to enable the School Committee of Montague to give the school children a party that kept them from the streets and what is often the mischievous side of Halloween. May it continue to render community and inter-church service and be a contribution to community betterment.

The double ring ceremony was used, the Rev. H. R. Bell officiating. The bride wore a light blue gabardine suit with black accessories and a corsage of American beauty roses.
