### Rangers Are Hot

NEW YORK Rangers are still nine points out of fourth place in the National Hockey League standings and their chances of grabbing a playoff spot are not too bright.

Detroit Red Wings are fourth with 39 points but the Abelenes have played only 35 games as compared with Rangers' 40. Detroit's best break even is in those games-in-hand, then Rangers would need to make up 11 points to draw even with Gordie Howe and company.

However, Rangers' new coach, Red Sullivan has cause for jubilation because his outfit has been undefeated in the last four games. They earned a shutout with Rangers' first win against Boston in Toronto. This must make Red feel fairly good and undoubtedly he's thinking in terms of yet landing at least that fourth and final playoff spot.

### The Amazing Gump

DOUG Harvey may be getting \$30,000 for playing with the New Yorkers. Andy Bathgate is equaling goal scoring records but the fellow who is really the key to New York's recent success is goalie Loren "Gump" Worsley.

On Thursday December 27, Rangers trounced Bruins 9-3 and Worsley saved 37 times. That was one of his easy nights. Last Sunday in New York the Gump kicked out 47 as Babs and Rangers fought to a 4-4 draw. Monday night in Detroit, Rangers gained a 1-4 tie with Worsley again the hero, stopping 33 shots. Wednesday night Worsley held off 22 visitors to the Rangers, Gump blocked a total of 47 drives.

And so in this recent success of the Rangers' outfit, Worsley has averaged 42.5 stops per game. He has been hurt during contests but has returned after some patch work was done and played better than he did before the injury.

You can't heap enough praise on this great and game little goalie who is doing all this with his power by being the Rangers' first goaltender. But these figures far from tell the true story.

Worsley, like a lot of other NHL netminders play good for the Rangers for a four game stretch and see how they fare out. Perhaps Plante, Hall, Bower or Stavech could come through and equal Worsley's performance but they are very doubtful. The Rangers' defence has surely not given Gump much protection this season, yet the little fellow is rising to great heights. We are confident that if he has his best in front of him, he would be surely challenging for the Vezina trophy.

### His Is Tough Job

WE checked back on the work of other netminders and find they were having rather easy times of it compared to our over-worked Worsley.

Last weekend the storm spoiled our wire for a long enough time to keep us from getting some of the vital stats on other goalies. We had a hurried look at the last four games of these other goalies over a recent three game period and find that none of them approached the Gump.

Worsley by Detroit trounced 14, by Toronto 25, by Chicago 23 and by Canadiens 24. Had Worsley been in the Canadiens' nets during that brief period, he would probably think he was having a Christmas holiday.

Of course, any of the other goalies might rise to the occasion if they found themselves guarding the net for the Rangers. We aren't trying to belittle any of these other capable netminders but we'd only believe this if it were proved to us.

### A Great Pair

YES, all of Bathgate's great scoring feats were terrific but they would be purely coincidental things for Andy and Worsley decided to play better hockey. As it turned out, Andy and Worsley have provided the punch that has brought Rangers six points out of a possible eight in the last four games.

That kind of pointscoring is the way to close the gap on those fellows in front of you. That's what we want to see. We need the kind of attacks that are there if they want to take advantage of the opportunity.

We hope the New Yorkers can yet make it.

Two Canadiens jumped into a 4-0 lead on goals by Bernie Geoffroy from 45 yards, Talbot Don Marshall and Jean Beliveau. Tom Williams scored Boston's only goal early in the third period.

Canadiens fired 42 shots at Bruins' rookie goalie Ed Johnston, compared with 27 on Montreal's Jacques Plante.

Canadiens now have 41 points, five less than first-place Chicago. They have played 42 games, one less than the Leafs and less than Black Hawks. Boston remains in last place with 20 points.
