

Growing Area Ties Liberties Seen By Citizenship Council

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Citizenship Council has warned Canadians must act to avert increasing threats to their individual liberties.

The council adopted an eight-point program at its annual meeting here to stop this erosion and decided to study the increasing hate propaganda in this country.

A resolution adopted at the closing session of the two-day meeting said the council is disturbed over the position of individuals in today's society and the lack of protection for individual rights.

The council's second recommendation called for strengthening of a bill of rights in the Canadian constitution. It said the present bill of rights was merely an act of Parliament which could be amended or repealed.

Other council recommendations:

1. Broadening of grounds of appeals to the courts.
2. Enactment of a law on procedures spelling out the rules of elementary protection of the rights of individual citizens.
3. Establishment of a council similar to the British Council on administrative tribunals.

The council said the ombudsman with great success by a number of countries, including Sweden, Finland, Denmark and New Zealand.

Deep concern was expressed by the council over what it termed "the apparent lack of protection under the Criminal Code against racial or religious groups." It said this had been highlighted by a recent series of incidents in a country of hate literature directed against Negroes and Jews.

Executive Of Texas Sulphur Defends Purchase Of Shares

NEW YORK (AP)—An executive of the Texas Sulphur Co. said here his purchase of 1,000 shares of Texas Sulphur last month was something anybody could afford the price should have done.

"There was nothing improper illegal or wrong about it in any way," said Charles F. Fogarty, executive vice-president.

The bulk of the shares Fogarty bought in April were purchased 10 and 16 days before company confirmation of a rich copper-silver ore strike near Trinidad, Okla., which sent the stock price skyrocketing. He purchased his holdings, direct and indirect, to 4,000 shares.

Purchases by Fogarty, Thomas S. Lamont, director, and David M. Crawford, secretary, were disclosed Wednesday in a regular monthly insider report by the New York Stock Exchange reflecting stock transactions by officers and directors of listed corporations.

BOUGHT 1,200 SHARES
Lamont, who is vice-chairman of the company, bought 1,200 shares in April and 1,000 shares in May, raising a total indirect Texas Sulphur holdings to 14,200 shares.

Fogarty said he bought 330 shares on his first of Texas Sulphur shares in April.

The company confirmed the mineral find in the Trinidad area the morning of April 15. The announcement came after a period of extremely active speculation in mining stocks on Canadian exchanges. The fever was fanned by reports and rumors of mineral finds by Texas Sulphur and other companies.

Four days earlier, on a Sunday, Fogarty said that reports then circulating on the Texas Gulf discovery were "unreliable and possibly misleading."

The U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission was investigating the individual stock transactions.

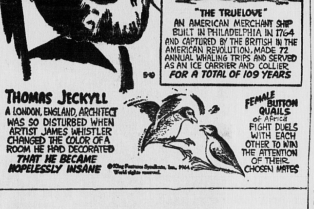
