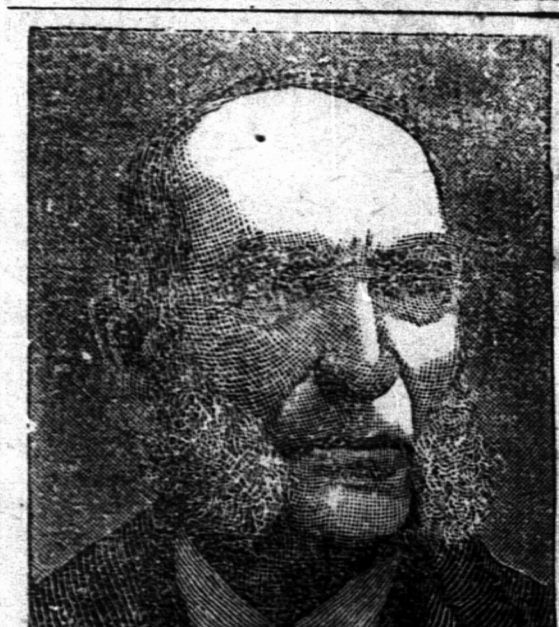

The C. P. R. After the I. C. B.

ST JOHN, July 22.—President Van Horne, Vice do. Shaughnessy and Mr. Angus of the C. P. R. and Lieut. Governor Kirkpatrick of Ontario passed through the city this afternoon to Halifax. It is understood that their visit is in connection with the acquisition of the Intercolonial railway by the Canadian Pacific railway.

LONDON, July 22.—The papers are still discussing the political situation. The Times declares that the Parliaments are the important factors in the fight and predicts another election. The Chronicle advises Gladstone to go right ahead with the Registration, Labor and Home Rule measures. The Post does not see the necessity of the Government resigning when the Opposition is such a disjointed horde of factions which disfigures the character and degrades the traditions of Parliamentary Opposition.

HALIFAX, July 22.—The Norwegian bark Juno, ran into some time ago by the San Antonio, and grounded near Cranberry Head, was sold yesterday, the hull for \$300, and the rigging for \$450. The vessel was bought by T. J. McMillan of Truro, and will be taken to Pictou and repaired.

Out on Bail.

BOSTON, July 22.—W. Robert May of St. John, the merchant tailor who was arrested for smuggling, appeared before Commissioner Fiske today and was let out on \$5,000 bail.

Foundered at Sea.

LONDON, July 22.—The steamer Milton, from Penang, has foundered at sea. Some of the crew and passengers were landed at Singapore. It is not known how many were drowned.

Cheese Shipments.

MONTREAL, July 22.—The Cheese shipments from Canada this year to England will be the best on record. Already two and a half million dollars worth have been shipped.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—Jack Allen and Mrs. Hebbden, the elopers of Montreal who were recently discovered here have skipped away again concealing their route and destination.

The Weldon vs. Hawke Case.

DORCHESTER, July 22.—In the libel suit of Dr. Weldon vs. Hawke, the Jury gave Weldon the plaintiff \$50 damages. Two Jurors held there was no libel.

Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M.

ROME, July 19.—The papal encyclical on the Columbus celebration that was issued Saturday, directs that on Oct 12, the mass of the Trinity be celebrated in the Catholic Churches of Spain, Italy and America in honor of Columbus. The encyclical also invites the bishops of other nations to say the same mass.

The World's Fair Will be Closed on Sunday.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—The house has concurred in the senate's bill closing the World's fair on Sunday, but rejects the \$5,000,000 grant.

THE HOMESTEAD TROUBLE.

ALLEGANY COUNTY, Pa., July 19.—Secretary Lovejoy of the Carnegie company said today that the company had information that would enable them to convict 1,000 men of Homestead. From an equally reliable source the reporter learned that of these 1,000, more than 200 were actual and active participants in the riot, and were armed with guns. These 200 will certainly be prosecuted to the full limit of the law. The other 800 may be prosecuted, but it is not likely that more than half of them will be.

The law of Pennsylvania in riots was interpreted by Judge King in a charge he made to the jury in Philadelphia in the Catholic riot cases in 1844. The judge, after citing the facts in the case, said in substance that everybody who was present during a riot, participating, aiding or abetting it in any way, was guilty of felonious riot, and should a death be caused by the riot he would be guilty of murder in the first degree.

Mr. Brennan, the attorney of the Amalgamated association, has advised the association officials to communicate with the state department with a view to securing the arrest in Scotland and extradition of Andrew Carnegie. Mr. Brennan is of the opinion that Mr. Carnegie can be held on the charge of treason in maintaining a force of unauthorized armed men, without constitutional right to do so, and if a warrant in his case is granted a strong effort will be made to have him brought to this country for trial.

The bringing of a force of armed men into one state from another is a violation of the federal constitution, and the committee has been advised that it has a good case against the Carnegie company.

Sir Charles on Emigration.

TORONTO, July 19.—A special cable from London says: "Sir Chas. Tupper, Canadian High Commissioner, in his annual reports referring to emigration, states that there is great difficulty in inducing persons of suitable class to leave the country. The report says that the proportion of immigrants to States from Europe, whose passages are prepaid, range from 50 to 70 per cent; to Canada 10 per cent. Sir Charles advocates the adoption by the Canadian parliament of the system of 'nominated' passages, which would largely increase the number of desirable immigrants to the Dominion."

Dilke's Unpleasant Position.

LONDON, July 19.—The Times says that after the excommunication of Mr. Parnell, it will be impossible for Sir Charles Dilke to return to official life. The country will not tolerate his admission to the Cabinet, and his admission will be thus barred. He will be a formidable and not too favorable critic of the ministry, none of whose members in the House of Commons are likely to compare with him in knowledge of foreign and colonial policy.
