Dodgers Gain Ground On Slump-Ridden Giants

BROOKLYN (AP)—The onrushing Brooklyn Dodgers won their sixth game in the last seven starts Tuesday, downing Chicago 7-6 in the National League with the aid of homers by Jackie Robinson and Duke Snider.

Chicago didn't get a hit until there were two out in the fifth, but they knocked out Roy McMillan to score four runs in that inning. Gene Baker hit his 12th home run with a man on in the big inning and Hank Sauer slammed his 29th with the bases empty in the sixth off reliever Bob Miliken.

Brooklyn ripped into Warren Hacker for a run in the second and flattened the Cubs' right-hander with a big five in the third during which Robinson hit his 10th homer with a man on base. Snider's 25th came off Bill Trent in the seventh, the run that actually provided the winning margin after the Cubs rallied for one in the eighth.

Billy Loes worked his last three innings, striking out four men, although he was touched for three hits and a run.

Tennis Stars In Dog House

TORONTO, (CP)—Two of Canada's top tennis stars are in the dog house as far as Ontario tennis officials are concerned.

Both Lorne Main of Toronto and Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., refused to play in the provincial championships being played off this week instead, they are playing exhibition games against the Childean Davis Cup team in Montreal.

"I have written a letter to Canadian Lawn Tennis Association president Harry Marpole of Montreal, protesting the action of Main in refusing to play in the tournament," said Staff Beck, president of the Ontario Lawn Tennis Association. Main and Bedard told Beck they needed a week off from tennis. They had played in last week's Canadian championships.

Canadian Lawn Tennis Association by-laws say a player must play in three tournaments a year to rate national ranking. Main and Bedard are competing in only two the Canadian and Quebec championships.

It's unlikely they will lose their rankings. As one tennis official put it: "They have us over a barrel and they know it."
