Pope Paul Uses Italian For Rome Church Mass

ROME (AP)—Pope Paul, setting an example for Roman Catholics everywhere on the first day of major changes in the mass, offered mass in Italian Sunday in a Rome church. The Pontiff bent low at a simple altar facing a packed congregation of 1,500 at All Saints Church, with the main altar to his back. He began mass in the language of the participants instead of in Latin.

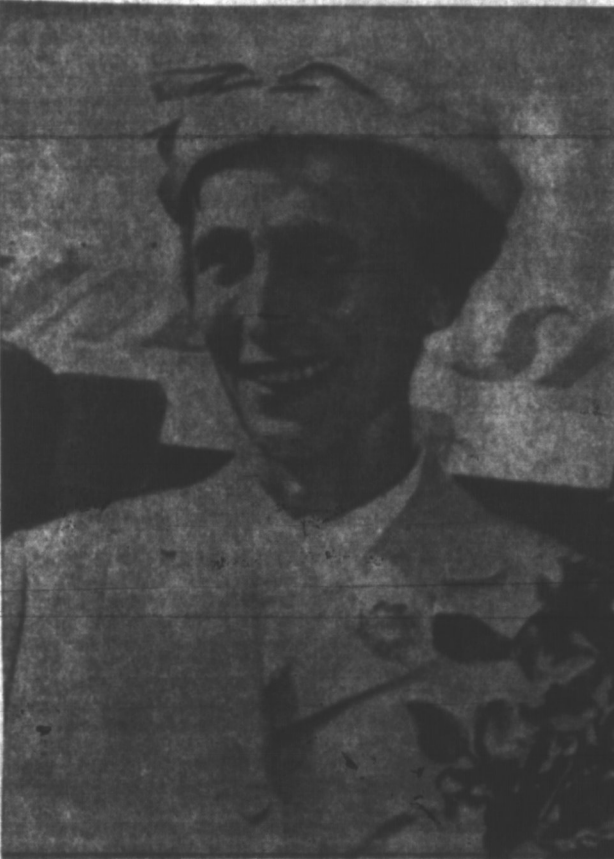
