#### At Least Three Records Set Up At Fair

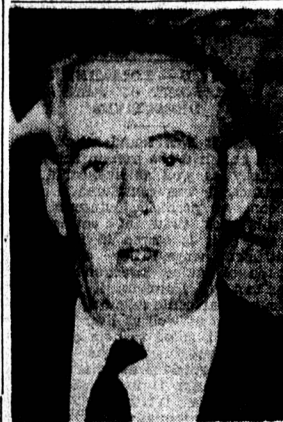

OTTAWA, Aug. 18—(CP)—The general rail strike deadline less than four days off, the Federal Government today sent a special mediator into the halted railway-union negotiations.

#### C.N.R. Management Preparing To Close Down Ferry Service

Notwithstanding that the Borden-Tormentine car ferries "Abegweit" and "Prince Edward Island" are owned by the Dominion Government and not by the Canadian National Railways, they will be affected by the impending railway strike in the same manner as railway property unless there is direct Government intervention in the matter, the Guardian was informed authoritatively yesterday.

No consideration, so far as The Guardian could ascertain, has been given to the fact that this Province has been guaranteed continuous communication with the mainland, and that the ferries were provided by Parliament for this purpose.
