## Shops Are Stocked For Rush Of Buyers

Housewives are preparing for the Christmas food rush.

A survey by The Canadian Press shows most stores throughout the country well-stocked and waiting, with proprietors beaming at the prospect of a record selling season. First reports indicate prices at about the same level as last year but turkeys may be scarce and a little more expensive in some regions.

Montreal, Calgary, Edmonton and Regina all report shortages of the big bird, traditionally featured in the Christmas feast, and price increases of five to 10 cents a pound over last year are anticipated.

Turkeys are late-comers to poultry shelves in most centres, usually appearing in quantity about a week before Dec. 25. Prices are expected to parallel the Toronto figures of about 59 cents a pound for small birds — in the eight-to-10-pound range — and 49 to 50 cents a pound for larger specimens.

Chicken is in good supply in most parts of the country and prices run at about 55 cents a pound.

Some store-owners predict a price-rise on all poultry shortly before Christmas, although Montreal shoppers are hoping for a drop from the current 70-cent-a-pound tag on turkey.

### OTHER MEATS

Other meat prices — on pork, beef, veal and the small rolled

meats popular in Quebec — are expected to match last year's. Loin of pork sells for about 59 cents a pound in most sections, ham at about the same price and beefsteak from 65 cents in Toronto to 75 cents a pound in Saint John, N. B.

Fruit, candy and nuts are in abundance everywhere and prices about the same as in 1954, although some western cities — such as Edmonton, Moose Jaw, Lethbridge and Regina — report 10-to 15-percent increases in nut prices.

Oranges are selling at from 39 to 55 cents a dozen, depending on size and quality, and cut mixed fruits run about 37 cents a pound. Fruit cake remains at last year's price level but varies widely throughout the country. Two-pound cakes cost \$1.05 to \$1.15 in Toronto; a four-pound chunk brings \$1.75 in Quebec; while a "big city deluxe" variety sells for \$2.50 in three-pound tins in Montreal.

Cranberries, for the essential turkey sauce, sell at 25 to 29 cents a pound in most parts of Canada.

Retailers report few innovations for the big Christmas meal but some stores suggest tired shoppers turn to gift certificates for food.

### TOO MUCH COFFEE?

WASHINGTON (AP)—Now the surplus problem is bothering world coffee growers. The United States department of agriculture estimated Monday that all coffee production in the 1955-56 marketing year will be 46,500,000 bags, about 13 per cent more than the previous year and about 12 per cent more than the pre-war average.

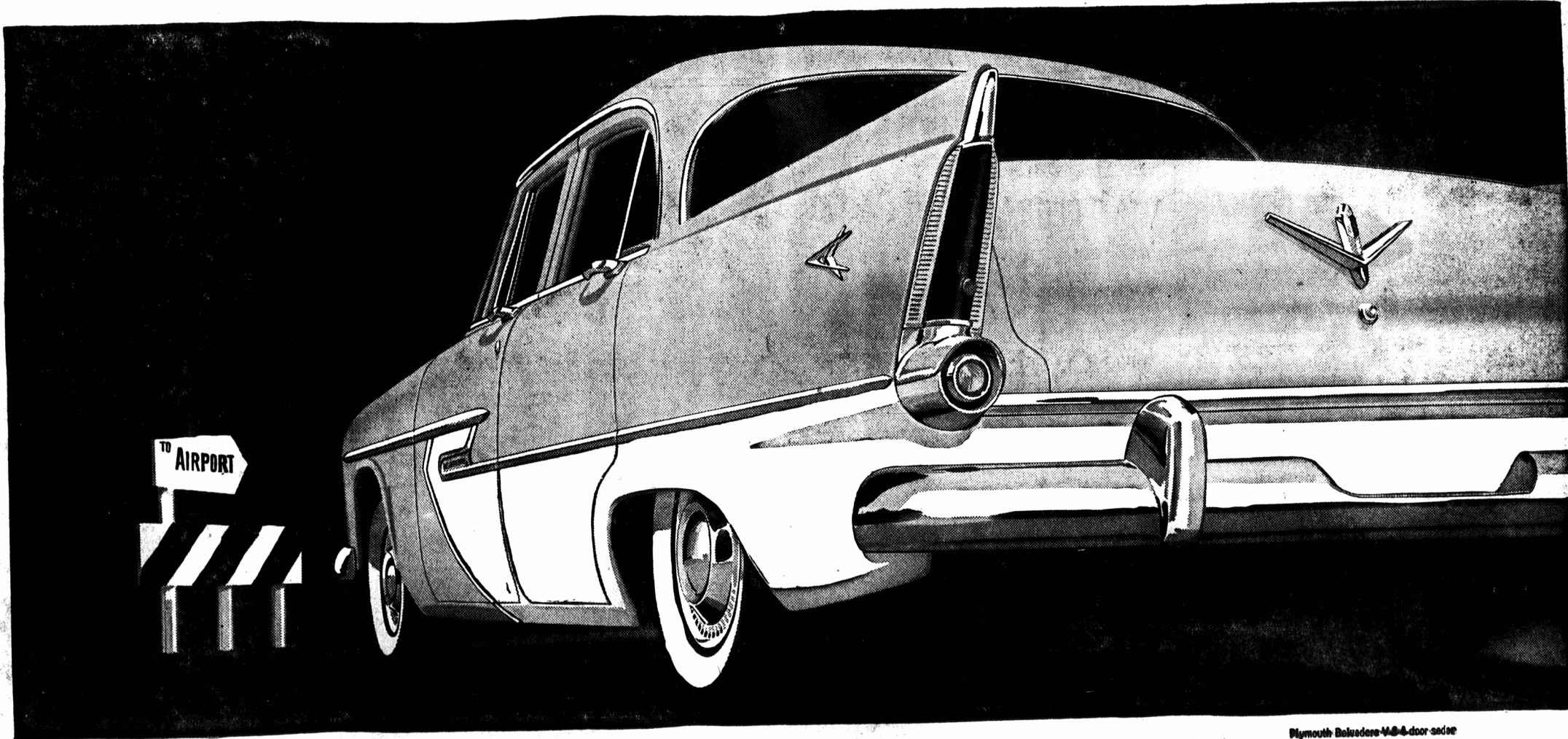

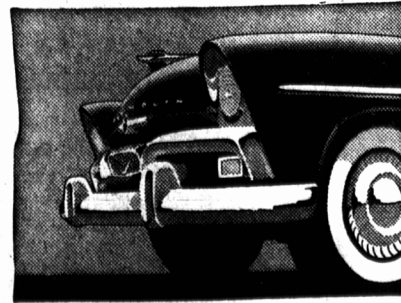

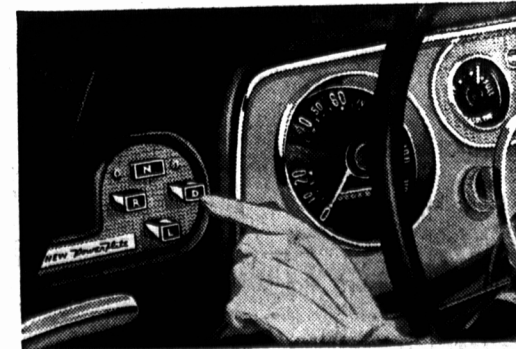
