LIVE STOCK SHIPMENTS.—The Summer-side Pioneer says: Considerable live stock was taken away in the steamer last week. On Monday W. S. McKie took away 27 fine horses, 24 of which were brought up from Charlottetown in the morning, the shipment altogether being 29. On Tuesday 36 lambs were shipped for Halifax by Mr. Chas. McNutt, and T. McManus shipped four horses for Memramcook. Again on Thursday morning Mr. G. B. McKay, of New London, took away 7 horses for Amherst and J. McDonald sent one to Boston, and Messrs. Drummond and Avarid shipped 220 lambs. On Friday Mr. Edward Gorri, of Tyne Valley, took away 7 and Mr. Geo. Clow of Wiltshire, 9 horses for St. John, while there were three others by different parties. Then on Saturday morning 13 were taken by H. M. Fowler, 5 by Thos. Lowther (for Amherst) and two were shipped by W. K. McKay. Mr. Fowler's lot were very fine ones for which he paid, we learn, good prices.

News From Halifax.

HALIFAX, July 29. Ten thousand quintals of bounty-fed, French-caught codfish were recently imported into Halifax, and the price of cod, which was over \$5 six weeks ago, has fallen to \$4.37.

General Manager Schrieber and other international officials inspected the Halifax terminus to-day. They report that travel was never so good on the I. C. R. as this season, but that the Springhill strike has somewhat demoralized the freight traffic.

James A. Fraser, ex M. P. P., has sold out the Eastern Chronicle to Stephen McKenzie. Rev. Alfred G. Jones, Pastor of the Free Baptist Church, has received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from a New York College.

The Insurance Agents of the city entertain Gov. Daly at a banquet to-morrow night. Mr. Daly was agent of the Imperial and other companies previous to accepting the governorship.

A Substantial Donation.

KINGSTON, ONT., July 29. The people and clergy of the Diocese of Kingston have donated \$10,000 to Bishop Cleary, in honor of his elevation to the Bishopric. The money will be tendered to him when he receives the pallium. In anticipation of the event the Bishop has ordered the erection of a Memorial Chapel, to cost \$15,000, and on Friday last the corner stone of the chapel was laid.

Lowering the Record.

FREDERICTON, July 29. On the Fredericton track this morning Dave Atherton's King Charles lowered the Maritime Province record by trotting a mile in 2.29. The time is accurate, being taken by two experts. The former record was 2.30, made at Halifax some years ago.

The Revolution in Buenos Ayres.

LONDON, July 29. It is officially announced that the English Government has received a telegram from Buenos Ayres saying the government has triumphed.

Sending Out Books.

OTTAWA, July 29. The Government, in response to requests from Australia, is sending out a large parcel of books bearing on the Canadian constitution, in view of a prospective federation there.
