Blackleg
Losses have been experienced, in various parts of the Province, this spring from Blackleg. These heavy losses can be prevented by having your calves and heifers protected.

Blackleg is a highly fatal, rapidly progressive, infectious disease of young cattle. Animals between the ages of six months and two years of age are most susceptible; although the disease sometimes occurs in both younger and older stock.

The germs are found in the soil and on forage in many areas. Animals become infected by eating or drinking contaminated food and water or through puncture wounds, and abrasions of the skin.

Blackleg symptoms are easily recognized. There is loss of appetite, high fever, rapid breathing and lameness, afterwards characteristic swellings appear in the muscles under the skin of the neck and shoulder.

Blackleg, while chiefly a disease of young cattle, frequently occurs in sheep. Heavy losses of lambs from blackleg have resulted when freshly docked or freshly castrated lambs were turned out into pasture where the soil was heavily contaminated with blackleg germs.

We And Our Neighbours

by Ruhamah Scheinfeld Frank EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN

Among my most delightful and so far, unrecorded hours in New York City, were the many I spent browsing among the books and magazines on child psychology (and mental hygiene) in the libraries of Columbia University.

Children, handicapped physically or mentally, are no longer as "handicapped children" but are studied at Teachers' College, Columbia, in a "department for exceptional children".

With students in the department for exceptional children, I saw a fine colored film showing what has been done in one large public school in Illinois, for these children. Many were almost totally blind or deaf, or so crippled or mentally retarded that they would have been sent in other places to separate schools, or institutions.

Every modern method to improve the physical and mental condition of these children was used without stint. Flash-backs showed us dazed and stumbling and fearful little creatures of a year ago, now transformed into boys and girls cooperating with all their strength, with teachers and nurses.

What about the gifted children that are also called "exceptional"? This film could scarcely deal with them, but I visited "The Clinic for Gifted Children" at the New York University. The wall was decorated with their paintings and

there were intricate maps and hand-work of all sorts made by them. There happened to be only two children around while I waited to speak with one of the directors of the clinic. The boy, a blonde, serious child of about six, was spinning a large globe. His sister, a year or so younger, jogged his elbow. He gave her a most indulgent smile and looked at me, grown up to grown up. "Small girls do interfere, don't they?" he asked. Obviously, he was a gifted child.

I was disappointed when the director told me that there was not enough money at present to really study each gifted child carefully. Mental and physical tests of various kinds were given, but careful studies of his background, and his emotional development were not made.

Out of this visit, however, came to me a clearer idea of the role of the gifted person in a community. The director and I discussed the two prevailing attitudes toward the education of the gifted child. One school of thought considers that the social and emotional adjustment of the gifted child is as important as the development of his particular gifts and that this adjustment can be served best if he is kept with his own age group.

The other school of thought believes that gifted children should be kept in a separate group. They have special contributions to make to the community, and these can be best developed with children of their own intelligence. If social and emotional adjustment means feeling in step with the majority, is that the chief aim for our gifted ones? Can they not be helped to accept their gifts in the way the true aristocrat of old accepted his obligations? Noblesse Oblige?
