TUESDAY

The best fishing stories of the year are coming out of Souris, the news has spread of the discovery of fabulous new herring fishing grounds, in the near waters of the Gulf of Saint Lawrence.
A dragger, the Harry G., owned by Raymond Griffin of Griffin Fisheries and chartered by Government authorities for the purpose of surveying the area, has been plying around the Gulf for a month using the most modern fish-detecting device.
The survey is believed to have yielded fine results. None of the Griffin people wanted to answer questions about the cruise, but other well-informed people are talking freely.

On one occasion, say these people, the survey dragger sailed for forty-five minutes over a densely packed school of herring, which was down deep near the sea-bottom.
Veteran Island fishermen have always believed herring to be that herring appeared briefly off Island shores in the Spring, and then disappeared for another year. It appears now that the fish retreat only to deeper water, and at the present time are bigger and fatter than the spring run of fish. They are described as being as big as mackerel.

"There are more herring out there," said one old fisherman, waving his arm in the general direction of East Point "than there are in the North Sea." And he concluded, "The North Sea has been supplying much of Europe for centuries."
