Liberal Leader Gives Statement

P.E.I. Liberal leader Alex Campbell was asked to comment last night on a report that John Mullally, former MP for Kings, will become his "special advisor" in the event that Mr. Campbell becomes Premier after the July 11 deferred election in First Kings. He made the following statement:

"One matter which I would like to clarify is the misleading statement of a Conservative cabinet minister that as many as five civil servants from New Brunswick and Ottawa had worked for the provincial Liberal organization during the campaign at public expense. This is entirely false. Mr. Mullally himself obtained a leave-of-absence from his official duties at Ottawa and at no time during the campaign did he draw a salary from the federal government.

"As for the recent and speculative report that he may at some future time serve as a special assistant to myself, I can only comment at this time that we would have to first win the election and be called upon to form the government; and secondly, Mr. Mullally's own views would have to be determined before I would make such a statement.

"No such agreement has yet been arranged, although I have admired Mr. Mullally's ability and genuine interest in his native province of Prince Edward Island."

J.E. Green, regional director of Old Age Security for the province, said yesterday that applications for pensions have been slow in reaching the regional office. Pensions will be paid at age 68 starting in January of 1967.

According to Mr. Green, approximately 750 persons will be eligible for pension at the reduced age at the beginning of next year but to date applications have been received from only 205. He has urged that all persons born in the year 1898 or earlier, except those now receiving an Old Age Assistance pension from the Provincial Department of Welfare, submit applications to his office as soon as possible in order to avoid any delay in payment.

months before the information necessary for a decision is obtained. We had one case recently where an applicant was found to be four years older than had been supposed, and another where the applicant was proven to be at least three years older. This meant, of course, they were eligible to a pension much earlier than they had expected. Hence anyone who does not have positive proof of his date of birth should contact the Regional Old Age Security office in Charlottetown with whatever documents are available so that we may examine the case immediately and advise him on the procedure to be followed in establishing his date of birth.

Mr. Green also reported that some inquiries are being received in his office regarding the supplementary payment to pensions of \$25 per month. He advised that all such inquiries should be directed to the Provincial Department of Welfare which will be administering any such program.
