NEW CANNING PLANT SCHEDULED TO BE OPERATED IN CENTRAL BEDEQUE

—As indicated elsewhere in an advertisement in this paper, a new industry devoted to the canning of fruits and vegetables is about to be organized at Central Bedeque.

Operating under the management of Messrs. Harold Campbell and Lloyd Burns, this new enterprise will be an extension of the business done by these two men who now operate a poultry dressing plant under the well known name of "Campbell & Burns".

This new canning industry, which enters a field of production scarcely touched in this Province, is expected to be a boon to farmers in this general area who will have sale for a type of produce for which there was scarcely any previous market, as far as most Island farmers are concerned, and which should permit a more diversified farming program than has been possible in this Province which has tended to put too much dependence in potatoes as the one and only cash crop during the last few years.

While experience will provide a guide for future canning operations, this year it is intended to include such crops as peas, tomatoes, green beans, wax beans, shell beans, onions, asparagus, etc. Because the planting of some of these vegetables would begin within ten days or so, farmers who are interested in growing some of these crops will have to make arrangements almost immediately with this new company in regard to seed, and other matters related to production.

In an announcement made yesterday by Mr. John S. Wright, it was learned that Messrs. Campbell & Burns have purchased the newly renovated creamery by the Dunlop River Dairies Co. and will use this for their canning operations. Thirty feet in width and one hundred feet long, this building has an "L" shaped addition extending another fifty feet in length. Option had been taken on equipment and machinery required to process the crops that will be handled, and everything is expected to be installed and ready for canning sometime by mid-summer.

Yesterday, in discussing the plans for this new industry, Mr. Burns said that they propose to form a joint stock company which will be incorporated under the name of "Campbell & Burns Ltd.", and that in keeping with the spirit of trying to work toward the economic betterment of the primary producers of the area, stock in the new company will be offered for sale to the general public.

"Having recognized for many years the unsound method of reasoning by which we import into this Province vegetables of a quality inferior to what can be grown here," Mr. Burns said he hoped it will be an encouragement to producers and consumers alike to note the recent trends to do something worthwhile. "The Island produce available on the shelves, not only in the larger consumer areas, but he said, "Our immediate objective is for the farmers to get these vegetables planted and growing, as soon as possible." —S

In West Prince County, with plenty of herring for bait available this year and fine weather forecast, fishermen expect to put out the bulk of their gear before the week-end. At Alberton South a number of boats were loaded last night from the thousands of new traps piled on the wharves and the remainder will load up this morning in readiness for the twelve o'clock deadline.

PANEL TRUCK TENDER
