#### There's No Place Lovelier Than A Farm In June

All week on this island farm, its family lived according to the tale of its cropping. Of seeds and the sowing, it was - of oatsy grains, and those of the grasses spent on this and that field of its husbandry. Long, the days were. In good time, mornings brought the farmers to the field-work. We sometimes heard the beat of machines continuing on into the dusk. Now the heart - the heat, of our seedtime is over. Of the acreage spring - cultivated, only that of the mangels now prepared, remains to be sown. And all week, threaded in, interwoven, with the scenes of the cropping, which after all is the bedrock of our living, were to be enjoyed, the attendant delights of the season: the traceries of new leaves against the morning, stirred by a happy June wind, or again in the leaves! "I wonder what luck she had!" "I'd say too" Alex observed today, "our pigeon has her babies. I wonder what luck she had!" So our week has gone by, each day busy and full. A visitor remarked somewhat enviously one day "There is no place lovelier than a farm in June, is there?" And another with apparently little liking for farming in his makeup another day offered, "It looks nice, but as far as I'm concerned" he chuckled, "you can have it!" And we were well content, knowing that the occupation gives one so many heart - warming, lowly, homely things. Because as another says: "I like such homely things... as smell of mint, Fresh rhubarb in the Spring... the taste of tea,

#### All The Fixin's Fixed For A Roadside Picnic

OFF you go this weekend for a long drive along the lesser traveled roads, where you can stop at any lovely place that suits your fancy. You won't have to bring your grill or look for a site that has one, because the food you have planned needs no further cooking. It should be prepared the night before, wrapped in aluminum foil and plastic bags and refrigerated (not frozen) overnight.

Small Equipment Be sure to take along paper plates, paper sauce dishes and paper cups; sippers, forks, knives and spoons (plastic if you like); a wooden cutting board; a slicing knife in a case; bottle opener; Boy Scout knife; roll of paper towels; extra aluminum foil; rubber bands; paper napkins and a plastic tablecloth. Pack this small equipment by itself in a box or basket. Picnic De's Plan a meal as substantial as though to be served at home. Use a large picnic basket or hamper. As far as possible pack the layers of foods in the order in which they will be served, with of course, the ones to be used last, on the bottom. Use plenty of cardboard or heavy-duty aluminum foil to separate the layers of food. Pack cake in the pan in which it is baked and cover with heavy-duty foil. Include foods suited to everyone's taste. Pack baby foods, and a prepared canned formula, spoon and bowl in a separate plastic bag.
