Former Kelvin Grove Man Dies In Vancouver

Mr. C.C. Baker, Kensington has received a letter from a cousin, Mrs. Howard Nodwell, nee Bertha Picketts, Calgary, conveying the sad news of the death of her brother, Bruce Picketts on June 15, 1957.

He was the youngest son of the late Alma Picketts and his wife, nee Jane Baker, formerly of Kelvin Grove. The late Mr. Picketts left for Dakota in the year 1904 and after living there for a few years moved to Asquith, Sask. Later he lived in Delisle where he specialized in dairy farming, and Battleford, before moving to Vancouver where his death occurred. He had been in ill health for some time.

In addition to his immediate family, he is survived by his only sister, Bertha, Mrs. Nodwell, and three brothers, Gus Bert and Bill, all in Western Canada. One brother, Herdon, predeceased him.

Mrs. Nodwell visited relatives and friends in her native Province in 1955, for the first time since she and her parents followed her brothers West in 1905.

O'Leary Seeks 165 Donors

Again this year, a live-wire committee, headed by Mrs. J. H. MacWilliam and Mrs. L. G. Dewar, is out to establish an all-time high record in attendance at the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic to be held in the O'Leary School next Tuesday evening between 7 and 9 a.m. Contacts have been made in the several districts surrounding O'Leary where canvassers are at work lining up donors and transportation; all previous donors have been notified of the event by post-cards; all persons who have received transfusions in the past year have been asked to urge relatives and friends to attend as donors; and all clergymen have been written with regard to urging attendance at next week's Clinics.

For next Tuesday's evening's Clinic, O'Leary has an objective of 165 donors. The Committee in charge feels confident that this objective can be reached, or even surpassed, as last year's Clinic produced 152 donors.

G. G. Bennett, Chairman of the Blood Donor Committee from the Alberton Branch of the Canadian Legion, reports that the canvass for donors in that area is progressing favourably. He too, hopes to exceed the quota of 110 set for the afternoon Clinic to be held at the W.I. Hall on Tuesday between 2 and 4 p.m.

Baptists Conclude Annual Meeting At Central Bedeque

The concluding sessions of the 90th Annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island United Baptist Association were held Saturday and Sunday, June 22nd and 23rd, in the Central Bedeque United Baptist Church, bringing together a near-record attendance of delegates and visitors.

The principal speakers at Saturday's sessions included Rev. Fred Helps, national editor of Baptist Publications, Rev. Gerald Hunt, representative of the Grand Ligue Mission, Quebec, Dr. Myron Brington, principal of the United Baptist Bible Training School, Moncton, and Rev. Charles Taylor, a member of the staff of Acadia University. The latter mentioned Acadia's proposed financial campaign to net a million and a half dollars for the extension of the university's facilities.

At the Saturday afternoon session Miss Alice Clark, Bolivia, and Mrs. Gordon Carder, India, addressed the Women's Missionary Societies. At the meeting of Baptist Laymen, chaired by Mr. Colin Waugh, plans were laid to organize a provincial Baptist Laymen's Association, the following to act as officers: President R. A. P. Adams O'Leary, Vice-president, Robert Hogg, Summerside Secretary-treasurer, George Lewis Charlottetown; and Laymen's Representative to the Baptist Laymen's Association of the Maritime Provinces, Frank Jenkins.

Among the resolutions passed was one in which the Association reaffirmed its protest against the continued violation of the Lord's Day Act through the operation of theatres and other places of amusement where a fee is charged for admission regardless of the purpose for which such fees are used. It was resolved that the above resolution be circulated among the churches for the purpose of securing signatures to be forwarded to the office of the Attorney General and that the aid of the

Lord's Day Alliance Act be sought. The Nominating Committee recommended the following to serve the Association during the coming year: Moderator, Rev. H.L. Milton, Charlottetown; Vice-Moderator, Rev. Keith Hobson, Summerside; and Clerk, Rev. Owen Cochran, North River.

Yesterday's sessions were in the nature of inspirational services. Rev. H.L. Milton received a newly-constructed gavel, symbol of the office of Moderator, from the retiring moderator, Deacon Charles S. Scranton. Mr. Milton preached the Association Sermon on the theme, "Crusading With Christ." Other speakers for the day included Dr. J. Murray Armstrong, General Secretary of the Maritime United Baptist Convention, and Rev. Lawrence R. Atkinson, Field Evangelist for the Maritime Convention. The former spoke on "Conditions of Spiritual Revival" and the latter called upon Baptists in Prince Edward Island to support the Maritime Crusade for Christ. He mentioned the fact that two regional evangelistic efforts are slated for the fall: one in Summerside under Dr. Ivor Powell, "The Man From Wales" and one in Charlottetown under the Reverend Edgar J. Bailey, the pastor of the Westmount Baptist Church, Montreal.

Music for the Association services was supplied by the choir of the Central Bedeque United Baptist Church, directed by Mr. Alden Leard. At the conclusion of the service Saturday night, a recital of Sacred Music was given by Barbara Rogers and Stirling Inman, accompanied by Paul Cudmore, all of Charlottetown.

Mr. Crozier was in the barn milking at the time of the outbreak, but was some distance from where the straw was located and didn't know of the fire until he was summoned by Mrs. Crozier, who fortunately happened to be out in the

yard and saw the flames. They immediately started carrying buckets of water from the pump in the barn and contained the fire until neighbours arrived to lend a hand. Mr. Horace Heustis brought with him a fire extinguisher and quelled the remaining embers. The fire originated from the electric pump cord and not from the wiring in the barn.
