SPORT ECHOES

Two One Man Shows In Game

The game between the Summerside Pope Motor Aces and the Borden Legion Nationals Wednesday evening featured two one-man shows, DAVID MARTIN and GABE KEOUGH, whose styles of play seemed similar. They are fast skaters and tricky stickhandlers. And, brother, how shifty! Martin potted four of his team's nine goals, and Keough fired five goals out of seven for the defeated Borden team.

Martin struck early getting two of his goals in the first five minutes, only 58 seconds apart. And Keough ran or rather skated amuck in the final three minutes of the game, scoring three of his five goals. The only defence the Aces had against Keough at that stage of the game was the clock.

WILLIE GALLANT and BOB PERRY were Martin's chief aides de camp. Gallant with a goal and three assists, and Perry with one marker and two assists. LYNN FOLEY, who starred with the Junior Legionnaires last year, potted an unassisted goal, and DAVE MacPHEE whose sniping has improved over last year also blinked the red light. LUCIEN HAMELIN, newcomer to the Aces, tallied

one to complete the Pope Motor scoring.

GERARD ROBERTE set Keough up three times, and those two made a lot of dangerous forays into Ace territory. JOHN NOONAN and DON MURRAY accounted for the other two goals. GERALD CLIFFE, the boy with the steamroller technique, made his usual headlong dashes down the left boards, leaving sprawling bodies in his wake. His football tactics started a dourbrook in the second period which turned the penalized players in the penalty box into sardines. Two game misconducts were handed out in the final few minutes of play, and further action will no doubt be taken.

Charlottetown has a real live well-balanced junior league going under the guidance of IVAN DOHERTY, one-time president of the Prince Edward Island Hockey League. A lot of competent young hockey players have been coming out of this league, and will no doubt continue to do so. Summerside has no similar junior program, but Summerside High Physical Education leaders, CHARLIE BALLEM and CHARLIE MORRISON, are putting a lot of emphasis on the high school league this year, and this should go a long way towards training young juniors for hockey in the higher brackets.

Two Way Tie For Second In Palm Beach Tourney

PALM BEACH GARDENS, Fla. (AP)—The teams of Billy Farrell — Dave Lichardus and Doug Sanders-Al Besselink fired 6 1/2 Thursday and took a two-stroke lead with 127 midway through the \$275,000 PGA best-ball golf championship.

The pace was 17 under par. After 26 holes, it took a score of at least 136 to qualify for the final two rounds of the 72-hole tournament, richest in pro golf history, which will pay the winning pair \$50,000.

The Jack Nicklaus-Arnold Palmer combination, which led the first round with 63, dropped in a second-place tie with the team of Howie Johnson and Chris Mocher at 126, two strokes off.

Brothers Jay and Lionel Herbert who finished second in the inaugural tournament last year, were in third spot at 130.

The cutoff will leave the low 60 scorers and ties in the concluding two rounds from a field of 126 teams which started Wednesday.

HELPED EACH OTHER Sanders and Besselink made the most of best-ball team play. Five times, one or the other went into the water and five times the player with the dry ball birdied the hole.

Besselink carded six birdies in Thursday's round, which tied the course record, and he's stroked 13 of them in their first 36 holes.

"We don't play safe," said Besselink. "But we played together for years as amateurs and we know how to club each other (advising on which club to choose)."

Sanders hit three birdies in a row between the sixth and eighth holes.

Farrell and Lichardus burned the back nine of the west course in 30 to come home with 62. They had 10 birdies and missed an eagle by two inches at the seventh hole, when Lichardus hit out of a bunker.

Farrell contributed six of the birdies.

HAVE WON BUT \$5,000 A win in the tournament would do a lot for their earnings. So far they have won less than \$5,000 between them.

Palmer and Nicklaus were decidedly unhappy about their second round, in which Palmer put his ball in water hazards four times, Nicklaus once.

"It was a wild day," said Nicklaus. "We went in the water at every possibility."

Between the two of them, they missed only one hazard. "We didn't do anything well," said Palmer.

Defending champion Butch Baird and Gay Brewer Jr. carded a 69 for 125 total and dropped eight strokes back.

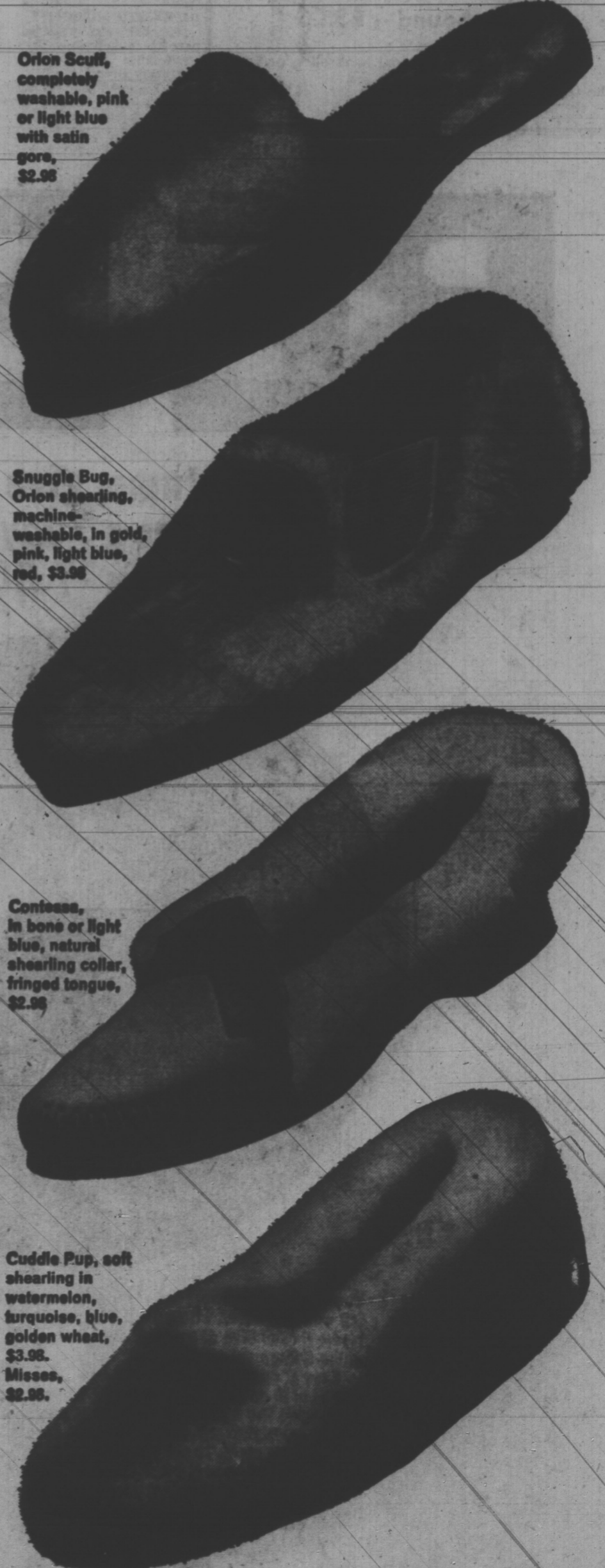
