

Provincial C.W.L. Executive Meeting Blood Donor Clinic Cancelled

An executive meeting of the Provincial Catholic Women's League was held on Tuesday evening, Nov. 23rd, in the Knights of Columbus Home, Charlottetown.

The Provincial president, Mrs. Basil Macdonald, occupied the chair and called the meeting to order. The league prayer was recited in unison, led by the Provincial director, Rev. George MacCormac.

Minutes of the previous meetings were read by the recording secretary, Mrs. F. J. Steele, and approved by the members, as well as the correspondence, and business arising from same dealt with.

The report of the Provincial treasurer, Miss I. Macdonald, showed the league to be in good financial standing.

The Reverend Director in an informative talk, urged each convenor to do her utmost to further the work of the Catholic Women's League in this province.

Mrs. Macdonald, the president gave many highlights of the business sessions of the National Convention, held in October at Cap-de-Madeleine, Quebec, and which she attended as the representative of the league in this province. The president spoke in glowing terms of the vast amount of work carried out by the one-hundred and ten thousand members (110,000) of the great league family across Canada, and the ever increasing interest taken in all lines of league endeavours.

An interesting feature of this meeting was the report given by Miss Isabel Macdonald, outlining in detail the course which she attended on Civil Defence at Arrprior, Ontario, in October. Miss Macdonald strongly urged all members of the C.W.L. to become Civil Defence conscious, as the National president has offered the services of the Catholic Women's League to the government of Canada to assist in this worthy cause.

The meeting closed with prayer by the Rev. Director.

Due to an epidemic of infectious hepatitis, commonly known as yellow jaundice, the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics which were scheduled to be held in this province the week of December 6th, have been cancelled.

Apparently the disease is province wide but the extent of it is not known since all cases are not reported to the family doctor. It is therefore not considered wise to carry out a blood campaign until the epidemic clears up.

It is with regret that the Red Cross is obliged to make this announcement since the need for the re-establishment of the blood supply at the Halifax "spot" is very great at the present time.

Tito Denies Plans Of Returning To The Cominform

KOPAR, Yugoslavia, (AP)—President Tito has denied and denounced what he called malicious accusations that Yugoslavia plans to return to the Russian-led Cominform, from which it was ejected in 1948 in a quarrel over Communist policies.

He acknowledged Yugoslavia has re-established relations with the Soviet Union, expressed hope that they would "improve even more" — on a basis of equality, and said Russia now considers Yugoslavia an "independent and sovereign country, which Stalin refused to do."

Tito thus became the first Communist chief of state to denounce Stalin publicly and to praise the new leaders of the Kremlin for renouncing policies of the dictator who died in March, 1953. When Stalin ruptured Soviet-Yugoslav relations, he denounced Tito as a Fascist and a henchman of Western imperialism.

Tito, spoke Sunday before a crowd officially estimated at 35,000 in this Adriatic port city which was incorporated into Yugoslavia last month as a result of a compromise settling this country's feud with Italy over the future of the territory of Trieste.

STRESSES INDEPENDENCE

All the emphasis of his address was on Yugoslavia's policy of independence from domination by either the East or the West.

He paid tribute to the economic help Yugoslavia received in the lean years between 1948 and now. Speaking of Britain, France and the United States, he said: "So far these countries have not shown they are our enemies, but at the most trying moment that they were our friends. We have no reason to break with them."
