BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH A MINIMUM WAGE FOR LABOURERS ON CONTRACT WORK BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: No person shall engage or hire any labourer or workman for any work being done within the City by or under any contractor or of the nature usually done by contractors if managed or directed other than by the owner of the property upon which such work is done for a lesser rate of pay than One Dollar an hour irrespective of the term or period of hiring, nor shall a labourer do any such work for any lesser rate of pay.

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: No person shall engage or hire any labourer or workman for any work being done within the City by or under any contractor or of the nature usually done by contractors if managed or directed other than by the owner of the property upon which such work is done for a lesser rate of pay than One Dollar an hour irrespective of the term or period of hiring, nor shall a labourer do any such work for any lesser rate of pay. Any person or persons, including officers of any corporation, found guilty of an infraction of this by-law upon trial by way of summary conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the City, shall forfeit and pay at the discretion of the said Magistrate, a penalty not exceeding the sum of Ninety Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs; and in default of payment thereof forthwith, it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of the said City for any period not exceeding Forty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid. NEW YORK (AP) — Late strength in motors and savings and loan holding companies set the pace Friday for the market's second straight daily rise. The savings and loans spurred as a report was published in the afternoon that the Senate finance committee had voted to soften its action on last week that would have sharply increased taxation of stock savings and loans associations. Motors resumed their Thursday's rally and late in the session several of the auto stocks were traded on sizable blocks. Volume remained at least 20 per cent above last week's, compared with 2,790,000 shares. Dow Jones Industrial average advanced 5.39 to 855.00. DEPRESSION LIST Early in the day, the list was depressed by weakness in Bethlehem Steel which fell 1/4 at 33% on a large opening block of 12,000 shares.
