Newsprint Price Increase Is Imminent

TORONTO, Oct. 17 (CP) - A general increase in the price of newsprint seemed in prospect today with announcement by one of the big eastern producers that it was raising its price.

Abilbi Power and Paper Co. Ltd. advised their customers that their contract price for standard newsprint paper will be increased \$10 a ton effective Nov. 1.

This is an increase from \$100 to \$110, delivered in New York, and from \$96 to \$106 in the base Canadian price. Prices in both countries vary somewhat by zones on account of freight rates.

The Abilbi announcement follows a similar one made Oct. 12 effective Oct. 16, by Powell River Paper Co. Ltd., big Pacific coast producer, located up the British Columbia coast from Vancouver.

While each company sets its own prices it is customary for others to fall in line when one or two lead the way.

Daring Break At Summerside

A daring break took place last evening sometime before 10 o'clock at the War Assets Store on Water Street, Summerside.

Mr. Norman Pritchard, the manager, said that without making a complete check, he estimated about \$300 worth of merchandise was taken, including five or six leather jackets valued at \$30 each.

There was some money in the cash register which was not taken, but apparently an effort had been made to break into it as a number of the buttons had been pushed.

Entry was gained by springing a padlock on the street door.

The break was discovered when members of the staff working at the P. E. I. Bag Co. plant across the street noticed some suspicious activity and called the police who immediately instituted a search.

Mr. Pritchard said that a large canvas container used for keeping coal had disappeared and had apparently been taken to carry away the loot.

This store had been broken into previously on three occasions within the past year. A week ago a pane of glass in one of the front windows was broken but nothing was taken on that occasion.

Consider Holiday Observation And Store Hours

On Monday evening a public meeting of the Retail Merchants Committee of the Summerside Board of Trade was held with the chairman, Mr. Alan Holman presiding.

This committee was formed some time ago and is made up of representatives from the local department stores, the specialty stores and the independent grocers. The duty of the committee is to make recommendations to the Board of Trade for their consideration or for the consideration of the Town Council regarding such matters as the local observance of holidays and also the hours of closing.

Members of the committee present were Mr. Alan Holman, Mr. William Smallman, and Mr. Lloyd Gorrell representing the department stores, Messrs. Ross MacKenzie, Jerry Sheen, Maurice Mill and A. G. Rogers representing the specialty stores and Mr. Mark Gaudet and Mr. J. C. Mountain representing the independent grocers.

The committee passed a resolution for the consideration of the Town Council asking that all local stores remain closed on Sunday.

It was agreed that when any special day was approached by a private group requesting that any special day be observed as a holiday that the request would first be submitted to the members of the committee for their consideration and recommendation.

It was recommended that the regular closing hours now in force through the week continue as five o'clock and 9:30 on Saturday, November 11th will be observed as a holiday but stores will remain open until 9:00 o'clock on the evening of November 10th.

Stores will close on Wednesday afternoons during December with the exception of December 20th. On December 21st and December 22nd they will remain open until 9:00 o'clock and on December 23rd until 9:30 P.M. December 26th, Boxing Day, will be a holiday. Wednesday, the 27th stores will remain open all day, Saturday, Dec. 30th, they will close at 9:30 P.M.

It was pointed out that these recommendations do not apply to the neighborhood grocers and the committee is not trying to regulate their closing hours.

It is planned to have ads run by each individual store before a holiday announcing that they will be closed on that day. - S

Consumer Credit Controls Placed Before Cabinet

OTTAWA, Oct. 17 (CP) - Regulations to curb consumer credit in Canada have been prepared by the Finance Department. They are now awaiting cabinet approval.

This was expected today, but because of a heavy agenda of other matters, the Cabinet did not get around to considering them. The Cabinet meets again tomorrow when approval may be given.

It has been indicated the regulations will affect a wide range of the buying public, including those who seek personal loans, installment purchases from departmental stores and those who finance automobile purchases through automobile financing corporations.

The regulations may: 1. Enforce higher down payments on installment buyings. 2. Cut down the length of time in which the credit is extended. 3. Cut down the amount of money an automobile buyer can obtain from a finance corporation. 4. Tighten up on the amount of money which a loan seeker can obtain from a personal loan corporation.

Similar action already has been taken in the United States. The Canadian action, when approved, will follow other steps already taken to fight inflation.

These include freezing of the dollar and tightening up of regulations under which the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation grants mortgages.
