Strange But True

Did you know that all the creatures of the insect world, during the time they are growing, burst open and shed their skins? Most insects shed their skins not once but several times in the course of their development.

When the insect becomes an adult, when it outgrows this last suit of teenage clothes, it usually appears in public wearing wings, and happy as a boy in his first pair of long pants. Once an insect gets its wings that's it. It never gets another new suit.

It is not for the little fig insect, we would have no figs. Not only that, but in providing us with such a delicious fruit the useful little insect gives up its own life! The first three sprouts brought to America from far away in Asia Minor flourished in the soil of California, they strange to say, the trees bore no real figs and this greatly puzzled scientists until they discovered there were no fig wasps in America to pollinate the fruit. So the tiny insect and all was brought to the New World and liberated among the sterile fig trees of California.

Result: In a few months there were millions of them. They crawled into the end of the figs in the fruit-bearing trees, carrying the pollen of the fig with them. Then they came out and died. The miracle had taken place.
