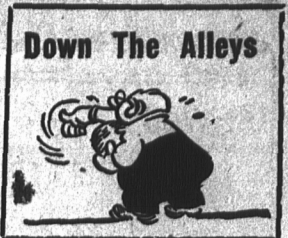

## Murphy Hurls Two-hit Ball As The Rovers Score First Shutout With 11-0 Victory

"Whacker" McEachern's Rovers today are firmly entrenched in first place in the City Baseball League as they batted their way to an 11-0 shutout victory over the Western Anchors in last night's scheduled game played at the Park diamond.

It was the first shutout scored by any team this season and Rovers thoroughly deserved it as they played errorless ball behind the two-hit flinging of Emmet Murphy, the big righthander, making his first start of the season holding his opponents to singles in the first and fourth innings. Anchors never threatened seriously. Twice "Pud" Roach got as far as third base only to die there with his mates much-needed hits.

Rovers on the other hand again displayed the timely hitting that now has won them three straight games. Although getting hit eight times by the combined deliveries of McFarlane and McEachern, the two Anchor hurlers, they made every one of the wallops count as runners rode the paths; the game was settled early also; two doubles in succession after two runs were drawn a pass drove in two runs while they manufactured their own run of the opening innings.

Again in the second they counted three times on two hits, an error and a fielder's choice; single counter their total to eight and they made it double figures with an error three-run uprising in the seventh. Rovers had pushed across another run in the eighth but this was wiped out by the anchor pitcher George Francis, called the game before the winners had been retired.

Fielding feature of the game went to Charlie Ryan, Anchors' catcher who faced the ball in the sixth frame to make a spectacular catch of Murphy's high pop fly.

With the island heavy title back once more in his grasp George Leslie is going after bigger and better things. Leslie's announcement last night that the big Souris boy would meet Bill Sparks, recently crowned heavy champion of the Maritimes, in a bout at the Sporting Club between the first of July and the sixth.

Leslie, just as big and game as they come will be facing on a big night the boxer he looks the Amherst flash. A terrific hitter and a fast, heavy puncher, Sparks should enter the ring on the night of the fight a top-heavy favorite to be returned to the winner, but still in all he will have a battle on his hands.

Leslie isn't by any means a smooth boxer but his gameness and determination plus his ability to withstand punishment and his heavy jarring punches he throws continually, might turn the fight into a closer battle than most would expect. Leslie isn't the easiest man in the world to knock out, besides he will be carrying a huge weight advantage that might mean a lot if the fight should turn out to be a long affair.

Rovers last night established themselves more firmly than ever as favorites to cop the City League title. Again giving one of their flawless exhibitions, the northend team have the happy faculty of coming through with hits when they are needed most and this has been one of the determining factors in their three victories.

But the biggest surprise concerning the team has been the brilliant hitting they are getting. At the start of the season their crop of pitchers available were just considered as being of average ability. How far the dopsters were wrong is well borne out by the performances that three of them have come through with.

In their three games they have allowed just the sum total of 10 hits or a 3 and 1-3 average. McEachern hurled 3-hit ball in the opener. Blinn came along with a five-hitter in the second and then last night Emmet Murphy capped the team's new pitching prowess with two bingles. If this state of affairs keeps up and Rovers continue their errorless ball the rest of the league will soon be seeking desperate ways and means of stopping the high-geared crew that "Whacker" McEachern manages.

## Red Sox Comb Two Hurlers For Ten Hits In Whipping Kensington Squad 12-4

The Summerside Red Sox combined two Kensington hurlers for 10 hits which were good for a total of 17 bases and marched to a 12-4 victory over Kensington in a drab encounter at the school diamond last evening. The game completed the first round of the season schedule and was the Sox third win in as many starts giving them full possession of first place.

He made no effort to chase balls which did not fall near him and lobbed gentle throws back to the diamond after each catch.

## Dean Does Trick As Cubs Down Bees For 5th Straight; Yankees Again Take Chisox

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—Dizzy Dean gave further proof of his return to consistent winning form today by pitching Chicago Cubs to their fifth straight National League baseball victory—a 7-1 decision over Boston Bees.

In achieving his fourth triumph of the season against no defeats, Dean limited the Bees to six hits. Boston failed to get a safe blow until the fifth inning when it bunched three for its only run.

Meantime, the Cubs pounded two Boston hurlers for 11 hits. Chicago concentrated its attack in the second inning when five hits, including Augie Galan, a homer with the bases loaded, accounted for five runs.

Young Morton Cooper was just about perfect as a relief pitcher, hurling five shutout innings and getting three hits in three times at bat, as St. Louis Cardinals defeated Philadelphia 11-5.

The Cards struck the Phils to all their runs, including a homer by Emmet Mueller, before breaking into the scoring column. Kirby Higbee's witness helped them to four runs in the fourth inning.

After letting a six-run lead slip away, Pittsburgh Pirates rallied with two out in the ninth to score two runs and beat New York Giants 8-7.

AMERICAN LEAGUE  
 NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—The World Champion Yankees, coordinating their forces with customary success, crushed Chicago White Sox 6-1 today to sweep their three-game American League baseball series and bring their season's record against the pale hose to nine victories and one defeat.

Aleky Donald spaced eight hits with good effect to earn his eighth triumph without a defeat.

After Chicago started the scoring in the second inning with a run on two singles, an infield out, a forced out and Mike Treash's double, the Yankee marksmen opened fire.

In the third three singles scored New York's first run, and an error and an infield out added another. Then George Selkirk of Hantsville, Ont., hit his 11th home run of the season in the seventh and helped win the final three runs in the eighth.

The Red Sox took the odd game of their series with St. Louis Browns 7-3 as Jack Wilson tossed six-hit ball to win his fourth game of the year.

Wilson shut out the Browns in all except the sixth inning, when they made half of their hits and all of their runs.

The Athletics won a great uphill battle against Detroit Tigers, "hubby Dean's sacrifice fly with bases full in a ninth inning giving the A's a 6-5 victory.

Dean pinch hit for Wayne Ambler after Joe Galtenben's double an intentional walk to Lynn Nelson and Pinky Higgins' error of Dario Lodigiani's grounder filled the sacks with one out.

Washington staggered in with a cushion over Cleveland although Senators' pitcher, Harry Kelley, was slammed for 14 hits including homers by Ken Keltner and Hal Trosky.

WINDSOR, Ont., June 22—Canada's last three survivors passed from the Canadian Tennis Championships as twilight fell over the Windsor Tennis Club's clay courts today.

Two of the last stands were brief and the other brilliantly long. Marvin Buxby of Miami, Fla., the tournament favorite, tossed aside one of the sensations, Bruce Hall of Toronto, 6-3, 6-0, 6-1; Carl Fischer of Detroit stumped little Dr. Georges Leclerc of Montreal, 6-4, 6-0 and Bob Madden of Detroit threw back the prolonged bid of Bill Pigott of Hamilton, Ont., 10-8, 4-6, 6-2, 6-1.

Morey Lewis, the bounding colossus from Texarkana, Texas, completed the semi-final lineup by defeating Jack Schlesinger of Detroit, 5-7, 6-0, 6-2, 6-1. In tomorrow's second-last stage Buxby plays Madden and Lewis opposes Fischer.

An overnight rain clung to the courts most of the day, but when they dried the United States contingent threw back the ambitious Canadians with despatch, except in the case of Pigott. To have progressed to the semi-finals would have meant by directing the play to the Dominion's Davis Cup team for Hall, Leclerc or Pigott.

The chunky Pigott, whipped his forehead deep to the wings, fought as gallant a fight as the tournament has seen. He was beaten by the same tactics Madden used to subdue him in the Ontario tournament last week at Toronto—a cross-court game that kept the Hamilton boy on the run across the baseline.

Fischer's remarkable court coverage met Leclerc's deliberate play with an all-around delivery that boded no good for Lewis in their meeting tomorrow.

Lewis is pinning to settle down to push back Schlesinger. The good-natured Texan found opposition for his forte, a rousing net game, but he solved Schlesinger's hat-valleys by directing the play to the back courts more often.

POWERTON LAKES, N. J., June 22—Tony Galento isn't the only one who realizes Tony Galento's chances against Joe Louis Wednesday night lie in the ability of the ruddy number to rust in and land the first punch of the 15-round fight.

Joe Louis does too.

So the Brown Bombing Champion is packing a plan of his own to stop the Jersey Barkeep in his first charge. Simply, it's this, as explained by Joe himself, today.

"I'll ketch him comin' in!"

Joe has heard that Tony's battle plans have been drawn around that initial attack. As a result, the champion will be ready with two "cute" tricks when they square off in Yankee Stadium. They consist of his short-range artillery, a left hook, but, more particularly, a short right uppercut.

Louis has been using them against his sparmanates these last few days, and, although he still hasn't perfected his defence against left hooks, his short right, either to the chin or under the heart, does plenty of damage.

Joe went through his last full-time workout today, boxing six rounds. From now until Monday, except for a day off tomorrow, he'll spar only four rounds in each drill.
