THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Boiled Down For More Easy Reading.

Nova Scotia apples are bringing higher prices in London.

The Bryan Democrats have nominated Thomas Riley, a well-known lawyer, as candidate for Mayor of Boston.

The first installment of 500 car loads of potatoes in bond from Canada for Cuba passed through Saratoga on Tuesday.

Cecil Rhodes hopes to defeat Kruger in the Transvaal election and put in power a Boer more in sympathy with the Uitlanders.

Hall Caize has gone to Rome by order of his physician, and has been instructed to abstain from mental work for a period of four months.

The Pacific German fleet has been ordered to Shan Tong, there to demand satisfaction for outrages on German missionaries recently.

It is shown that from 1883 to 1895 Great Britain's exports have decreased £6,000,000 while Germany's have increased £21,000,000.

A huge waterspout passed down Lake Ontario, near the mouth of Toronto harbor, last week. It broke near the eastern gap and the cloud passed south.

Ferdinand Brunetier, as editor of the Revue des Deux Mondes, must stand trial in Paris for refusing to publish a reply to an unfavorable criticism of an unsuccessful tragedy.

The Methodist committee on missions met at Philadelphia last Thursday. It had \$1,39,941 to divide, and it gave 45 per cent. to home and 55 per cent. to foreign missions.

A New York woman killed herself because she had no aim in life. A curious feature of the suicide is that she shot herself through the head, thus proving that her aim was good.

The jurisdiction of the mounted police is being extended into British Columbia, the duty of preserving peace along the line of the Crow's Nest Pass having been assigned to the force.

According to a despatch to the London Times from Rome the Pope is in excellent health. He is now residing in a house built in the Vatican gardens, where he transacts business daily as usual.

A well known spirit merchant in Dublin advertised in one of the Irish papers that he had still a small quantity of the whiskey on sale "that was drunk by the Prince of Wales while in Dublin."

The official returns of the French customs house show that in the past ten months French imports have increased 76,184,000 francs and that the exports have increased 194,038,000 francs compared with the same period of 1896.

A young man with lung trouble began working in a Kansas city hardware store some years ago, and now he explains his robust condition by saying that it's due to the iron in his blood, which he inhaled in minute particles during his daily duties.

The official report of the irrigation by artesian wells in the Bosnie district of New South Wales shows the work to have been a great success and has given an immense stimulus to agriculture. Apparently 26,000 square miles of the interior of New South Wales will thus be irrigable.

Robert Kerr, traffic manager of the C. P. E. (western division) says of the company's Yukon service: "We are putting on a fleet of steamers of our own from Vancouver, running to Oyea and Fort Wrangle, to accommodate those going over the passes or going over Old Country, where there are now being the lower route by the Stickeen river. We are purchasing the boats in the construction. We will also have a railway line, narrow gauge, from Glenora, at the head of navigation on the Stickeen river, to Teslin Lake, about 120 miles, from which point it is easy sailing or rafting into Dawson.

"No sir, I never heard it, and I don't believe it either," was the reply.

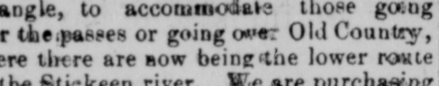

TO BEAT ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

A German invents a Gas Burner Which is Said to Emit 1,500 Candle Power.

United States Consul P. V. Demster at Crefeld, Germany, reports an invention which promises a great advancement in the illuminating power of gas. Ernest Salzberg, director of the gas works of the city of Crefeld, has invented an improvement in incandescent gas burners which relates to the production of incandescent gaslight based upon the discovery that when the pressure of the gas is considerably increased upon the incandescent body it emits a golden yellow light, agreeable to the eye, displaying objects in their natural colors.

The gas supplied to the burner at a pressure of about three and one-half atmospheres, the burner, by withstanding this high pressure, being of special construction. A single incandescent jet of the ordinary size can emit a light of much more than one thousand five hundred candle power.

The light is of such intensity that a person is able to read the finest print at a distance of one hundred to one hundred and fifty feet. The inventor says that the cost of this incandescent light of one thousand five hundred candle power is only four and one-half cents an hour, while that of the ordinary electric light of four hundred candle power is (in Germany) fourteen cents an hour.

In the apparatus constructed by Salzberg an hydraulic pressure of 35, and even more, atmospheres may be forced through the improved burner. The invention is, however, only applicable where waterworks exist. Mr. Salzberg has applied for letters patent in the United States.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 16.—The Russian embassy here has made an announcement to the Turkish government that if Turkey intends to apply part of the Greek war indemnity to an increase of the Turkish armaments Russia desires to remind Turkey that the unpaid arrears of the Russo-Turkish war indemnity amount to a million three hundred thousand pounds, adding that if the policy of the Turkish Government is as indicated, Russia will demand the payment of this amount. The Russian pronouncement has strongly impressed the diplomatic corps, who believe it is directed against the plans to reorganize the Turkish navy.
