

any ship or vessel whatever, for entering or being received into the Naval Service of Her Majesty; nor shall any such entry be deemed a desertion from such ship or vessel, nor shall such seaman or other person thereby incur any penalty or forfeiture whatever, either of wages, clothes or effects, or other matter or thing; and no master or owner shall insert or introduce, or permit to be inserted or introduced into any articles or agreement, any clause or stipulation, whereby any seaman or other person shall or may incur any forfeiture, or be exposed to loss in case he shall enter into Her Majesty's Naval Service, and if inserted the same shall be void.

XXX. When any seaman shall quit any such ship or vessel as aforesaid, in order to enter into Her Majesty's Naval Service, and shall thereupon be actually received into such service, not having previously committed any Act amounting to and treated by the master as desertion, he shall be entitled, immediately upon such entry, to have all his clothes and effects on board such ship or vessel delivered to him, and to receive from the master the balance of the proportionate amount of his wages up to the period of such entry, after deducting therefrom all charges such seaman may then be liable to, under the provisions of this Act, to be paid either in money or by a bill on the owner; all which clothes, effects, money or bill, such master is hereby required to deliver and pay to him accordingly, under a penalty of Twenty-five pounds for every refusal or neglect; but in case the master shall have no means of ascertaining the balance, he shall make out and deliver to such seaman a certificate of the period of his service and the rate of wages he is entitled to, producing at the same time to the Commanding or other officer of Her Majesty's vessel, the agreement with the seaman, and every such master upon the delivery of such clothes and effects, and the settlement of such wages, in manner herein mentioned, shall receive from the officer in command of the vessel, into which the seaman shall have entered, a certificate of such entry, endorsed on the agreement, and signed by the said Officer, which such officer is hereby required to give.

XXXI. This Act shall continue and be in force for the period of ten years from the passing thereof, and from thence to the end of the then next session of the General Assembly and no longer.

SCHEDULE (A)

An agreement made pursuant to the directions of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, passed in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, between the Master of the ship of the port of the burthen of tons, and the several persons whose names are subscribed thereto. It is agreed by and on the part of the said persons and they severally hereby engage to serve on board the said ship in the several capacities against their respective names expressed on a voyage from the port of to (here the intended voyage is to be described as nearly as can be done, and the place at which it is intended the ship shall touch, or if that cannot be done, the nature of the voyage in which she is to be employed) and back to the port of and the said crew, further engage to conduct themselves in an orderly, faithful, honest, careful and sober manner and be at all times diligent in their respective duties and stations, and to be obedient to the lawful commands of the Master in everything relating to the said ship, and the materials, stores and cargo thereof, whether on board such ship, in boats, or on shore (here may be inserted any other clause which the parties may think proper to be introduced into the agreement, provided, that the same be not contrary to and inconsistent with this Act.) Inconsideration of which services to be duly, honestly, carefully and faithfully performed the said Master doth hereby promise and agree to pay to the said Crew, by way of compensation or wages, the amount against their names respectively expressed.
