# Young Victim Dies; Jury Impanelled

**SUMMERSIDE** — Stanley Woodcock, 17, son of Sgt. and Mrs. George Woodcock, RCMP officer, was critically injured in a shooting incident here the station Tuesday evening, died in Prince County Hospital here at approximately 12 noon Saturday.

The youth, who was attended by Dr. J. K. Beer of Summerside, was unconscious from the time of the accident. He was reported suffering from a spinal cord injury.

The local detachment of the RCMP investigated the incident and a jury was empaneled following the youth's death, but it will not be known for a number of days if an inquest will be held.

Members of the jury are: Joseph Clark, Claude Harkness, Ferno Rogers, Gerald Sheen, Arnold Masten, D. Alex MacDonell and Windsor Courtney. Surviving the deceased along with his parents are a twin brother, George Ross, at home, and a sister, (Mrs. Alice Hay), in France.

Other survivors include a grandfather, George Woodcock, Trenton, Ont., and great-grandfather, Mr. and Mrs. George Woodcock, Dundee, Scotland, and Mr. R. Ross, Aberdeen, Scotland.

The remains are resting at the Compton Funeral Home until Tuesday noon when they will be transferred to the Regional High School auditorium for services at 2 p.m.

Interment will take place in St. John the Baptist cemetery.

**ST. CATHARINES, ONT. (CP)** — Chicago Black Hawks scored six consecutive goals to hand the third period to come from behind a 3-0 deficit and defeat Toronto Maple Leafs 6-3 here Sunday in a National Hockey League exhibition game.

Ron Stewart and Frank Mahovlich put the Leafs ahead 2-0 in the first period. Mahovlich added his second late in the second period on a hard shot from just inside the blue line.

Stan Mikita and Phil Esposito led the Hawk comeback with two goals each. Johnny McKenzie and Doug Robinson got the others.

In Peterborough, Ont. Saturday, the Leafs led two goals from Jim Pappin to blank Boston Bruins 3-0.

Pappin rattled his two past Bruins rookie Jack Norris in a 27-second span in the second, providing the Leafs with all the margin they needed. Allan Stanley fired the third in the final period.

**Man Injured In Prince Co. Accident**

**SUMMERSIDE** — A resident of Summerside East, Levi MacArthur, is a patient in Prince County Hospital following a car accident on the highway between Ellerslie and Mt. Pleasant at approximately 8 o'clock Sunday morning.

The car in which MacArthur was an occupant is reported to have left the highway and sustained considerable damage.

Members of the local RCMP detachment investigated the accident over the weekend.

Friday evening they were called to a two-vehicle collision at the intersection of Notre Dame and Duke Streets.

The vehicles involved were a late model automobile driven by Levi Lauret Gallant of Summerside and a 1960 model driven by Marshall Green, also from here. Damage was reported as only minor.

At approximately 9:15 Saturday evening an European model vehicle driven by Edward Lecky of Central Beedee collided with the rear of a taxi-cab driven by Bud Cullen at the intersection of Maple and Granite Streets.

Damage to the Lecky vehicle was estimated to be \$200 while the Cullen driven automobile sustained little damage.

**Copters Ferry Food To Turkish Cypriots**

**NICOSIA (AP)**—United Nations helicopters ferried tons of emergency rations Sunday to the besieged Turkish-Cypriot village of Kokkina. Turkish-Cypriot leaders complained, however, the airlift did nothing to help starvation in other villages.

The UN peacekeeping force flew food from its own stocks to aid the 1,500 Turks in Kokkina described as near starvation because of an economic blockade by the Greek-Cypriots.

A few hours later, however, the Turkish-Cypriot leadership issued a statement calling the provisions inadequate and once again urging the United Nations to demand that the Greek-Cypriots lift the blockade.

Other incidents on Cyprus Sunday kept the island tense. The Turkish-Cypriots claimed two elderly Turkish-Cypriots were shot and wounded by Greek-Cypriots in separate attacks.

Greek-Cypriots were reported to have advanced 500 yards toward the Turkish-Cypriots near the Kyrenia Mountain stronghold. The Turkish-Cypriots denounced the advance as an aggression.

Canadian UN troops dug in at a new gun position on the other side of the Kyrenia stronghold in anticipation of new trouble.

**Near Perfect Orbit Obtained For Syncom III**

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—A near-perfect "stationary" orbit has been achieved by Syncom III, which will relay a variety of Olympic Games television coverage from Japan to North America.

The U.S. National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced Saturday the last of nine corrective manoeuvres was completed Friday. It said as a result the satellite appears to hang motionless in space over the equator and the international date line.

Television signals from Japan will be beamed to the satellite which will relay them to Point Mugu, Calif., for transmission by land lines across the U.S. and Canada. Tape recordings will be flown to Europe also for showing there.

The satellite was launched Aug. 19 from Cape Kennedy, Fla.

Observations Saturday show the satellite's period of revolution is 1,436.158 minutes, compared with the 1,440 minutes of the earth's 24-hour revolution.
