A PROPOSITION

To Sell Cuba for \$250,000,000

Probably a Feeler.

HAVANA, April 11.—In the palace a telegram was shown yesterday saying that the Queen Regent had agreed, upon the intervention of Russia, to accept two hundred and fifty million dollars for Cuba, and end the war and withdraw her flag.

THE CUBANS FIRM.

Will Make no Terms Short of Absolute Independence.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Mr. Quesada, a representative of the Cuban Junta, is in the city. He said, yesterday, that the Cubans are glad to see their belligerency at last recognized by the Spanish Government.

The Cubans, he said, will not cease fighting nor entertain any negotiations which have not for their basis the absolute independence of Cuba.

REJOICING IN GREAT BRITAIN

Fall of Khartoum Assured.

Lord Salisbury Makes a Master Stroke

LONDON, April 11.—Rejoicing on account of the great victory in the Sudan is universal in Great Britain, and the fall of Khartoum is regarded as assured.

Lord Salisbury's coup in China is regarded as a master stroke.

UNITED STATES AND SPAIN

An Armistice Granted to Cuban Insurgents

But the Situation Otherwise Unchanged.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY'S MESSAGE GOES TO CONGRESS TO-DAY.

Special Cabinet Meeting in Washington.

Consul-General Lee Bids Farewell to Cuba.

MADRID, April 11.—The ambassadors of the Powers, collectively, called upon Senor Cullon, yesterday, requesting that Spain grant an armistice.

The Cabinet then met, when General Corria, Minister of War, and Admiral Bermejo, Minister of Marine, objected to the granting of an armistice on the ground that it would be disparaging to the Spanish arms.

The representative of Russia, as a military power, replied that he did not consider that it would be a disparagement.

An objection was again made on the ground that there was no guarantee that the insurgents would accept an armistice.

The representatives replied that in that case an armistice would mean only a suspension of hostilities, and insisted upon Spain offering the insurgents a last chance of submission, for the sake of negotiating a peace. If the insurgents continued hostilities, the Spaniards would be allowed a legitimate self defence.

The Ministry then agreed that an armistice be granted.

News of the granting of an armistice was received on the bourse with satisfaction.

The Minister of War, after the council, which lasted for two hours, said to a correspondent of the Associated Press: "We yield to the prayer of the Greater Powers, granting what we have refused to the United States."

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The cabinet held a special session in view of the armistice passed by the Spanish government.

The proposal for an armistice, it was subsequently announced by one of the members, had not changed the situation in the slightest degree and the President's message would go to Congress to-day (Monday) notwithstanding the decision of the Spanish government.

HAVANA, April 11.—Consul General Lee and his staff left Havana yesterday. Before leaving General Lee called upon General Blanco to bid him good bye. General Blanco sent word to Lee, by an orderly, that he was very busy and could not see him.

MILITARY CHANGE.

Lord William Seymour to Command British Troops in Canada.

LONDON, April 11.—It is understood that Lord William Seymour is to be selected to succeed General Montgomery Moore in command of the British troops in Canada.
