### Says "Tonic" Sure Fire To Produce Winners

LONDON, Jan. 19.—(Reuters) — "The Barrie Tonic—shake the bottle and you've got a winner," says the label.

Anybody can buy this preparation—and, if the label isn't kidding, you can get rich quick. All that's needed is to slip a slug of the speed-juice into a nag and it will produce a turn of foot it never had before.

At least, that's what the proprietor of the tonic, 60-year-old Peter Barrie, claims for his patent medicine. He said at least 50 British racehorses, treated with it, have won as scheduled.

Barrie—whose nickname is "The Ringer" and who claims to be the original of that shady sportsman created by the late Edgar Wallace—thus rates as public enemy No. 1 to the Jockey Club, responsible for maintaining fair play on British tracks.

Barrie says it contains no pernicious drug—and can't be detected by ordinary sweat or saliva tests. He says he has a druggist make up the formula at three shillings (about 45 cents) a bottle. He sells it at 25 shillings a bottle. The Jockey Club is understood to have bought more than one crock of the compound to see what's in it.

So far the J.C. has issued no report on its analysis.

"I can afford to laugh," says Barrie. "They can't catch me."

Already a wealthy man, The Ringer says he'll soon retire to Australia — "after I've made a fortune."

The Jockey Club is reported still looking for a way to detect his "harmless dynamite."

British racehorses aren't given systematic saliva tests as in Canada and the United States, but Jockey Club stewards can order spot tests of contestants to check saliva and sweat for suspected drugs.

### Famous Ballet's Clever Pianist Is Calgary Girl

TORONTO, Jan.—(CP)—As the great ballerinas of the Sadler's Wells company whirl and spin on the stage above her, the equally nimble fingers of a Canadian girl pianist are keeping time in the orchestra pit.

Pretty, brunette Jean Gilbert, a Calgarian, as the troupe's permanent accompanist, has the distinction of being the only Canadian connected with the renowned British ballet.

"It's a tough job, Jean admits. "Banking hours" just aren't to get in the ceaseless practice her brilliant dancing demands. And the company's prima danseuse must have music to practice to, as must Moira Shearer and the rest of the company.

That's where Jean comes in. For 2 1/2 years her slim fingers have supplied the beat for the dancers' feet, both during rehearsals and in ballets which call for a solo piano. Jean joined the troupe in 1944. Her R. A. F. husband, Flt.-Lt. John Andrews, was killed in action only five months after he'd taken his bride to England.

**Start With Ballet**

Kathleen Tierney, a fellow Calgarian, got Jean a job with Sadler's Wells when the troupe went on tour of Britain and needed a pianist to play in the "Dante Sonata." The job led to a permanent

position, although Jean still does some concert playing of her own. Actually, her position with Sadler's Wells is an extension of her own ambition to be a concert pianist. Jean had studied under Gladys McKeivley Egbert in Calgary and achieved a keyboard competence that won her a scholarship to the Royal Conservatory in London, England.

"I feel I have had the opportunity and the training," Jean says, "and it's up to me to put it to a good use."
