**HAD NOT CONSIDERED ACT.**—Premier Thane A. Campbell of Prince Edward Island has not been able to consider the matter of taking action to implement the Central Mortgage Bank Act which was passed in the Legislature. Approved in the dying session of the Federal Parliament this spring, the new law will come before the Manitoba Legislature "at the earliest possible opportunity." Premier Campbell's only comment was that, as far as the Government of Prince Edward Island was concerned, the question of making the law operative here had not been considered yet.

**Plan Study Of Unemployment Insurance**

**BIGWIG ISLAND, Ont. June 21 (CP).**—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association, expressing no formal opinion, voted today at the closing session of its 88th annual convention to have a committee study the broad question of unemployment insurance.

Discussion on the topic was touched off by an address by W. D. Black of Hamilton, Ont., regarded as the most important speaker on the subject. He pointed out that unemployment insurance is a risky business involving heavy obligations.

"Whatever tentative limits may be set to its operations in the first instance, the inherent capacity and tendency of the costs of unemployment insurance to exceed vastly all estimates and expectations is a risk very conclusively not worth the running," Mr. Black contended.

In subsequent discussion, speakers generally opposed schemes that would be based on a "dole" angle and demanded they be on a strict actuarial basis. More than one speaker suggested the whole problem was in danger of becoming a political football.
