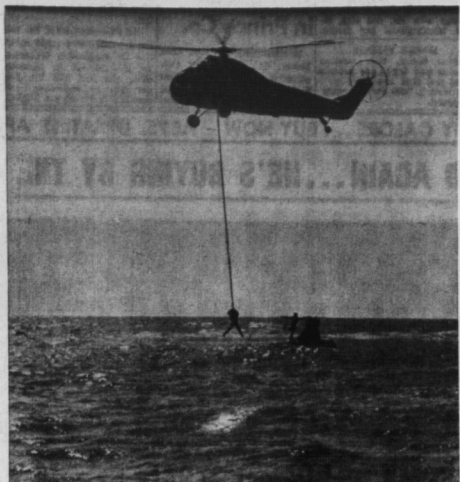

**Lack Of Confidence Seen Cause Of Stock Price Skid**

NEW YORK (AP)—The ticker tape marched jerkily across the translucent screen in a Wall Street broker's office, telling a depressing story of the worst stock market lull in recent years.  
It was nearly 3:30 p.m. — closing hour of the New York Stock Exchange — and prices were at their lowest point of the day.  
"Look at the tension on those faces," said a broker, surveying a crowd watching the tape. The faint faces, multiplied by thousands in hearing rooms across the United States, reflected what many experts contend has caused the market economic and non-economic.  
The heads of the two biggest stock exchanges disagree with the idea that investors might have become panicked by the extended decline.  
**CONFIDENCE SLIPPING?**  
"What we are witnessing is a considerable diminution of their confidence," said Keith Funt, president of the New York Stock Exchange.  
"This decline is no panic selling," chairman Edwin Packer, president and president pro tem of the American Stock Exchange. "We have had a two-year bull market and this evidently was a time for adjustment. Stocks are not getting down in realistic levels."  
A survey of Wall Street brokers indicates that many factors are involved in the slump, both economic and non-economic. They talked of the outlook for business, the attitude of gov-
