The Charlottetown Legion junior baseball team under the guiding hands of Vern Handrahan and managed by Charlie Ryan will be going all out to clinch the Maritime Junior title in straight games, Charlie Ryan told us yesterday.

Charlie was crying silently about the loss of 'Tex' MacDonald for Sunday's battle with the Fredericton Vikings at Memorial Field. Young MacDonald suffered an ankle injury recently and will not be capable of performing for the local junior forces for the remainder of the season.

Ryan told us the loss of MacDonald was a big blow to his club and that he now has only eight men of his original team fit for play. Charlie said: "We will have to bolster our forces and I think MacDonald's position may be filled by Allan 'Posty' Connolly."

The locals took a 1-0 lead in the best-of-three series for Maritime crown with a 3-1 decision in Fredericton last weekend. Ryan said yesterday: "I was talking with Frank Langmaid, Viking's manager, last night (Wednesday) and he said his team has just recently topped a New Brunswick Senior all-star team and that his boys are ready for the Charlottetown outfit."

Out of 56 games played by this highly rated New Brunswick aggregation they only tasted defeat on three occasions. One of those defeats came at the hands of the Charlottetown Junior Legion outfit last week, while another loss was suffered at the Dominion junior baseball tournament in Winnipeg. The Vikings won their consolation contest in the Canadian tourney.

Vern Handrahan, the Island's most successful baseball son, is confident that the Maritime Junior championship will come to rest in Charlottetown.

A large crowd is expected to wend its way to Memorial Field to support this junior club in their quest for the Maritime Junior honors. Plan to be on hand to do your part in supporting this team.

Montreal Als On March; Host Winnipeg Tonight

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes of the Eastern Football Conference who have earned four of their six season points against Western Conference clubs, will be out to run their winning string to three straight when they meet Winnipeg Blue Bombers here tonight. The Als, fresh from an 11-6 victory over the Grey Cup champion B.C. Lions in Vancouver last Saturday and a 24-13 win from the Eskimos in Edmonton Monday night, have won only one game against EFC competition—a 20-0 shelling of Argonauts here Aug. 18. Coach Jim Trimble said Thursday he will make only one lineup change for tonight's game. Charlie Baillie, a Montreal boy who played one season with the Als in 1961, will replace five-year veteran Dick Dalatri at centre for field goal and punting situations.

Dalatri was placed on waivers Wednesday. Trimble was reported to have become disenchanted with his inability to get off a good snap to Montreal kickers in recent games. Baillie played here last season with Quebec Rifles of the United Football League and has practised with the Als since July. Don Estes, an ex-Ottawa Rough Rider who came to Montreal earlier this season, will remain at offensive centre for other than third-down kicks and field goal attempts. Trimble said he thinks the Bombers are "a real good club" and said he was impressed with the way the Winnipeggers handed Ottawa Rough Riders a 10-12 loss last Sunday in Winnipeg. The Montreal coach said his defensive unit will pay particular attention to pass-catching end Farrell Funston and halfbacks Leo Lewis and Dave Ramey. Trimble was not impressed by the fact first-string Bomber quarterback Kenny Ploen is not making the trip East and that Dick Thornton will be at the helm. "We watched that Thornton boy against Ottawa Sunday and he's good. Everyone in Winnipeg respects him because of his ability to play both ways." Winnipeg coach Bud Grant announced Wednesday that Ploen will not play against Montreal, or in Toronto against the Argonauts Sunday. Grant said Ploen's strained wrist has not healed sufficiently to risk using the veteran quarterback in the weekend contests. Ted Rodosovich, a 245-pound guard from Baltimore Colts of

the National Football League is expected to make his debut in a Winnipeg uniform tonight. Trimble said he will stick with the dual fullback alignment of Pat Batten and J. W. Lockett, both recent acquisitions from NFL clubs. The two newcomers have split most of the ball-carrying chores since the retirement of veteran halfback George Dixon last week.
