

Student Council Plagued By Long Distance Phone Calls

The Student Council meeting Sunday Feb. 16, 1975 was attended by more students than usual because many of the election hopefuls came to get a glimpse of what Council meetings are like.

A suggestion was made by Gordon Campbell which would make non-attendance of executive meetings an impeachable offense. The discussion of the matter was indecisive and led into a motion of whether or not a Councillor could give someone else a proxy vote. The motion was defeated because many Councillors felt that this practice could lead to

non-participation by the elected Councillors.

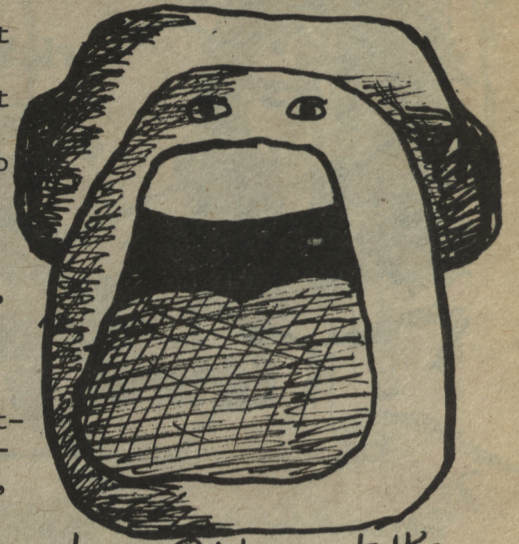
Jim Griffith recently bought a refrigerator for the Day Care Centre and has requested that the Student Union pay for half the cost. Councillors almost unanimously voted in favor of letting Jim pay for whatever he wants to buy.

The Student Union has recently been plagued by a large number of unauthorized long distance telephone calls. In order to rectify the situation it was suggested that all Student Union phones (except the main office) be run through by switchboard where all long

distance phone calls are kept in a log book. The bill was passed on the assumption that the University approve.

The Student Union plans to make a proposal to the Board of Governors to the effect that no late fees should be charged for non-working days, i.e. Saturdays, Sundays, or days that the University is closed because of weather.

The Personnel Board reported on the firing of the cafeteria staff. Craig MacDowell, head of the Personnel Board, stated that there was very little they could do about it now. Ted Gamauf will still have the power to hire and

VOTER ELIGIBILITY

1. Any student who is an active member of the Student Union is eligible to vote.

THIS MEANS if you paid your \$ 40 S.U. fee, you are eligible to vote.

2. You may vote for those persons running in your constituency.

THIS MEANS you may vote for all executive positions of the S.U. (like President Comptroller etc.) and also you may vote for those contesting the seats for Senate.

Concerning the by-election, all eligible voters may vote for those running in the Vice- Presidential by-election.



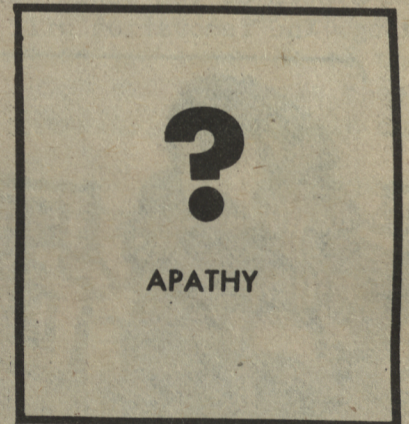
