NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

IRELAND.

(By Cable to the New York Herald.)

LONDON, Dec. 21.

The correspondent of the Times at Dublin says:—"The country is drifting nearer to the rocks and nothing is done to save her. The wave of agitation sweeps with greater force through the provinces, and although it has met with a check in Ulster, nobody can tell how long the barriers which the loyal feeling in Ulster imposes will be able to withstand repeated shocks at Mr. Parnell's hands. Coercion has triumphed while the Government shrinks from any attempt to counteract it."

The Times, in a leading editorial, says:—"Law-abiding citizens have to submit to terrorism which not only defies but supplants the law, and after looking long and anxiously for help from the Government, they have begun to resign all hope and no longer venture to resist the dictation of the Land League. Cases in which the police are able to arrest and magistrates able to commit, seem to become daily rarer, and even when a trial is secured, witnesses fear to speak and jurors are afraid to convict. It is to deliver the peasantry themselves, as well as the upper and middle classes, that the vindication of the law has become imperative."

Mr. David R. Plunket, member of the House of Commons for Dublin University, speaking at a conservative meeting at Chesterfield on Sunday, said the government was bound to fall. While deploring the outrages in Ireland, he asked his hearers to take into account the influences which are brought to bear on his countrymen by agitators seeking to serve their own purposes. Mr. James Stansfeld, radical member of the House of Commons for Halifax, speaking at Sowerby Bridge, said as a member of the Commission on Agriculture he had spent some time in Ireland studying the Irish question. They had now, he said, to face a great crisis, and he believed a remedy for the present state of things would be found.

Mr. Justin McCarthy, (home ruler), member of the House of Commons for Longford County, speaking before the Bermondsey Radical Club on Sunday night, said he had reason to know that Mr. Forster himself is as well convinced that the State prosecutions in Ireland must fail as were any of his audience.

The traversers intend, if allowed, to examine nearly a thousand witnesses at the trial, including tenants and evicted persons, to show that their language and conduct was justified.

A demonstration was made by 5,000 Irishmen in Manchester last night for purpose of expressing sympathy, with the Land League, and raising money for the Parnell defence fund. Chief Justice May was denounced in violent terms.

LONDON, Dec. 22.

Subpoenas for witnesses in the Irish State prosecutions have been issued on both sides. At the weekly meeting of the Land League Mr. Davitt stated distinctly that they did not wish any one to join the Land League except of their own free will. He also condemned indiscriminate Boycotting. An enthusiastic demonstration of Orangemen and Protestant farmers took place on Monday at Coleraine, county Londonderry, at which resolutions were passed energetically denouncing the Land League agitation and the inaction of the government relative to affairs in Ireland. The Scots Guards arrived at Dublin yesterday. There was no demonstration. A battalion of infantry has been ordered to get ready to proceed to Ireland from Aldershot. Judge Fitzgerald, closing the Winter Assizes for the province of Munster yesterday, said that lawlessness had not diminished since the assizes began. He had received four threatening letters during the assizes. The Marquis of Lansdowne, one of the heaviest Irish land owners, has abandoned his intention of spending the winter in Ireland in consequence of the condition of the country. A despatch from Vienna to the Times says:—"The decision of the Empress of Austria definitely giving up her hunting box in Ireland is in consequence of the reports received here of the state of things in Ireland."

It was reported yesterday afternoon that the order for the departure of 100 volunteers from the second battalion of the Scots Guards from Windsor to make up the strength of the first battalion had been countermanded. Nevertheless the volunteers afterwards started for Ireland, in accordance with the first announcement. The "St. James Gazette" says it has reason to believe that 300 experienced London police have been selected to strengthen the civil force in certain parts of Ireland and particularly in Dublin. The Dublin "Freeman's Journal" says that the suppression of the meeting at Calohill on Sunday was one of the gravest intrusions on public right and liberty ever committed, and accuses the Government of postponing the announcement of its intention to suppress the meeting to the last moment, so as to provoke a collision with the troops. It is stated that a battalion of the Grenadier Guards will go to Ireland on Friday. A circular has been issued to the constabulary to use the utmost vigilance to protect bulliffs and caretakers placed in

charge of houses from which tenants have been evicted, and to arrest persons who may illegally take possession of such houses. Another circular enjoins extra vigilance on patrol parties to prevent outrages by armed bands. A company of the Army Service Corps, commissariat and transport department, has been ordered to proceed to Ireland on Wednesday. The battalion of the Rifle Brigade from the troopship Himalaya disembarked at Queenstown yesterday, and has arrived at Cork. It will remain there with a regiment of infantry and three troops of dragoons.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

Farindina, Dec 12—Arrived brig Parnell, to load for Montevideo.

Norfolk, Va, 20th inst., cleared bark John Lefergey, for Liverpool.

Alexandra, Dec 16—Ar barque Nichola, Hooper, from Georgetown, P. E. I.

London, 21st inst.—Brig Lady Milton, McRae, at Queenstown from Charlottetown, had decks swept and lost bulwarks.

Brig Isabel, McLeod, from Prince Edward Island, lost jibboom and boats, and is in a leaky condition. The cargo is damaged.

Schr Jessie Newell, from Charlottetown, for New York, before reported put into Newport, R. I., after collision on Dec. 18, has been surveyed, and it is recommended that she be repaired before proceeding to destination.

The captain of the brig Nyanza, from Liverpool, which put into North Sydney with crew disabled, reports: Had a very hard passage, occupying 43 days; when off the eastern edge of the banks encountered a gale of wind, in which most of the crew were disabled; three of them had to be put into hospital here from effects of it.

The schr Emma, 31 days from St John's, Nfld, arrived from Port Mulgrave on the 21st inst. She was blown off her course, lost bowsprit, jibboom and all the gear attached, and was 21 days without seeing land. She will repair, procure new sails, and proceed to Prince Edward Island.
