SHIPMENTS OF PRODUCE

Cargo of the Sainte Marie--Other Shipments Being Made.

The Sainte Marie sailed yesterday evening for Bermuda with a full cargo of produce, etc., shipped by A. Horne & Co., for H. C. Outerbridge, of that place. A detailed statement of the cargo and its value is as follows:—

The horses are an especially good lot. They are nearly all heavy animals, and are pronounced by competent judges to be the best batch that has left the Province at one shipment. Among the horses is a handsome pair of greys purchased from Mr. J. J. Davies, and two of the heavy horses owned by the city-corporation.

A. Horne & Co., are loading the schooner Welcome at North River for the Provincial market.

The steamer Horton is expected here from Liverpool at the 25th inst., to load with oats for the old country. Matheson & Toombs will be the shippers. She will take about 120,000 bushels.

Mr. T. J. Dillon is shipping 323 boxes of butter by the Lake Winnipeg. His name was inadvertently omitted in the list published yesterday.

Carvell Bros. have loaded the schooners C. A. Churchill and Ebrov with potatoes for the Nova Scotia market.

There are two schooners loading produce at Stanley Bridge. There is also a schooner at Bay View loading oats and potatoes for Lunenburg, N. S. The schooner Howard L finished loading at the latter place and sailed for Sydney on Saturday. The Farmer says that oats are bringing 28 cents at Bay View, and potatoes 25 cents.

The same paper reports that shipping is brisk at Summerside just now. The large barkentine Daisy and Rita are now nearly loaded with oats and will sail for Great Britain, one at the end of this week and one at the beginning of next week, taking about 37,000 and 39,000 bushels of oats respectively. The schooner Boreas sailed on Monday for Cape Breton with a large general cargo of produce shipped by Mr. R. F. Holman. The schooner Lawrence is also loading with potatoes for Pictou. In addition to this a large schooner is now en route from Boston, which will be loaded with produce for the West Indies.

Italy Interested.

ROME, November 9.—The Calia Militaire evidently believes in a war between France and England, and declares that in such an event the least Italy could do would be to mobilize her navy and army. Maddalan Island, where the warships are gathering, is the key to the maritime defence of Italy. In ordinary times the active fleet would have gone into winter quarters at Spez.

The French Motto.

PARIS, November 9.—The Ganolis announces that henceforth the motto—"God protect France," will be stricken from French coin. It suggests the Government to adopt the motto: "Schwartzkoppen protects the Republic."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES

Montreal Gazette: If a plebiscite majority for prohibition does not bring a prohibition law, what was the plebiscite for.

St. John Sun:—The contract with the Allen and Dominion lines is settled as to the details, and was signed on Monday. On Saturday of the same week the first ship under this contract is to sail from Liverpool. The government has very properly taken the ground that the sailings of these mail steamships should not be on the same day as the sailings of the faster ships for New York, which also bear Canadian mails. It is, therefore, arranged that the sailings from Liverpool shall be on Thursday, a day intermediate between the date of departure of other mails. But as everything has been put off to the last moment, there is no time to adjust the Canadian service to these conditions. Accordingly the first five sailings will be made on days that the postmaster general condemns as rendering the Canadian mail service useless for practical purposes. This is another result of the system of postponement and panic which prevails in every department in the federal service.
