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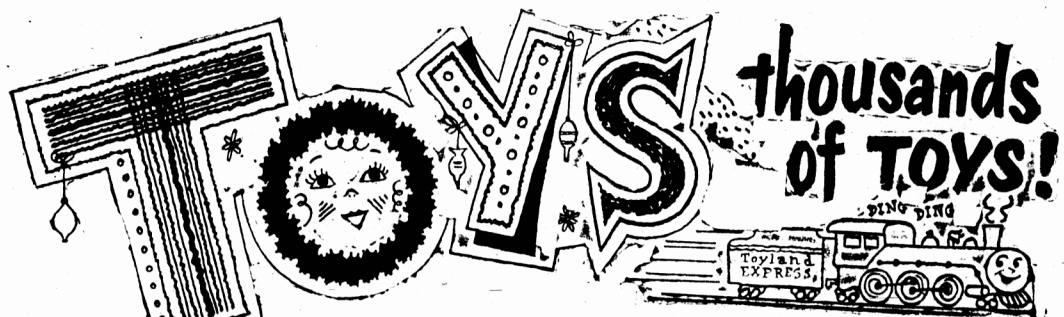
### Unemployment Insurance Claims

OTTAWA, Dec. 5 — (CP) — Unemployment insurance benefit payments and the number of unemployed days for which compensatory payments were made both increased during October.

The Bureau of Statistics reported yesterday that payments rose during the month to \$3,901,854 from \$2,570,904 in the corresponding month last year. The unemployed days for which compensatory payments were made increased to 1,567,172 from 1,540,670.

Initial and renewal claims for unemployment insurance benefits totalled 82,902, compared with 62,243 in October, 1950. Most marked increases occurred in Quebec and Ontario, where the adoption of short-time working scheduled or lay-offs continued in the textile and automobile industry.

Claims filed by provinces with figures for the corresponding month last year in brackets: Ontario 31,779 (19,753); Quebec 25,939 (19,779); British Columbia 11,031 (9,964); Manitoba 3,439 (2,327); Alberta 2,719 (2,187); Newfoundland 676 (376); Prince Edward Island 244 (226); Nova Scotia 3,481 (3,678); New Brunswick 2,666 (2,796); and Saskatchewan 1,031 (1,157).
