

# Will Attend Meeting Of APEC In Charlottetown

HALIFAX — S.C. Prescott, president of the Maritime Food Council, announced today that members of the Council will attend the annual meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council and the Atlantic Premiers at Charlottetown on Sept. 23 and 24th. The Food Council became an official agent of APEC on August 1st.

With the merger of the two bodies the more than 130 members of the Food Council automatically became members of APEC. Former manager of the Food Council, Clarence T. Fitz-Randolph, is now APEC's agricultural officer.

In urging members of the Food Council to attend the APEC sessions, Mr. Prescott said "this new affiliation will give greater impetus to the programs that the Council has been working in recent years."

The research and promotional facilities of APEC, Mr. Prescott said will enable the Council to extend its activities in the agricultural and food product field.

Plans for an Atlantic Food Product Show will be made at the Charlottetown meetings, he said, in urging food producers to attend.

These teachers are all from Central Royalty; and it is hoped that having the executive from the one school would facilitate their work for the coming year.

Following the reading of the minutes of the previous day's session, the program planned by the local was carried out by the assembly dividing into three groups primary, intermediate and senior. These groups were led by Naomi Newton, Weston Carmody and Frank Costello.

Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Assistant Director of Education, explained very clearly the curriculum changes for the coming year. He reminded the teachers of the music book "The New

## Worthington Quits Civil Defence Job

OTTAWA (CP) — At 68, F. F. Worthington is quitting as Canada's federal co-ordinator for civil defence because he feels he has done his job and is "still young enough to start a new career."

The fiery former major-general leaves his civil service post Tuesday, his birthday, to become an industrialist.

He has acquired an interest in Canadian Vicom Limited, a small plant at Kingston, Ont., producing tools, dies and jigs for heavy industry. His present payroll is 17.

A much-decorated fighter as a soldier, "Worthy" as he is affectionately known to thousands of Canadian soldiers who served under him during his 35 years in the Canadian Army, won the Military Medal and the Military Cross, both with bars, during the First World War. He took on politicians and public apathy when he left retirement in 1948 to organize Canada's civil defence.
