EGG CIRCLE CANDLING STATION OPENED IN CHARLOTTETOWN

The Prince Edward Island Co-operative Egg and Poultry Association announce that they have opened an egg candling and grading station in the city. This station is situated on Weymouth Street, the old soap factory having been rented for the purpose. The concern will be operated under the authority of the Executive Board of the Association and is purely a farmers' concern. The objects aimed at in opening this station are—to find a source from which the egg buyers may purchase honestly graded eggs on a quality basis, to disseminate a knowledge of correct methods of handling eggs among producers, to ensure justice being given to producers by paying for eggs on a quality basis, to help consumers by placing good quality eggs on the market at reasonable prices, and to enlarge and elevate the industry generally.

START WAR ON DISEASE IN SERBIA

NISH, Serbia, March 27.—(Via London)—Charles J. Vopicka, American minister to Serbia, has informed the Serbian government that the American Red Cross Society, acting in conjunction with the Rockefeller Commission, proposes to send to Serbia a fully equipped medical commission to combat the existing unsanitary conditions in the country. This commission will be under the direction of Dr. Richard Strong, director of the Harvard School of Tropical Medicine. The Serbian government has gratefully accepted Mr. Vopicka's offer. Health conditions in Serbia have recently been described as appalling. Typhus is raging throughout the country and other contagious diseases prevail. Recent travellers in Serbia have said that hardly enough people have been spared by typhus to bury the dead. The victims are found lying in the roads, and hospital conditions have been described as utterly inadequate and shocking. Sir Thomas Lipton said

recently that the situation in Serbia was entirely beyond the control of the local authorities and that the tents, hospitals, doctors, nurses, modern appliances and clothing were imperative—ly needed. 9300-4-1m&e21
