Our Book Table.

The Domestic Monthly—This invaluable magazine of fashion, literature and the fine arts, is to hand for May. It gives the latest streets costumes for women and children, and is well-filled with interesting notes, comments, stories, etc. Address, The Domestic Monthly, 853 Broadway, New York.

Virginia of Virginia is a story by Amelia Rives, and is intensely Virginian both as to the heroine and locality where the remarkable story is laid. But the nigger literature is a little strong for the general reader, as, without a knowledge of darkie jargon and life as it was in old Virginia, few would find the conversations intelligible.

Another of publisher Bryce's Toronto Home Series, is a Latin Quarter Courtship. Those who like English interlarded with French phrases, will find this story to their taste. It is a good quarter dollar's worth to them.

Some time ago, it became desirable to establish a winter crossing to connect the lower peninsula of Michigan with the upper of Lake Superior district, and the St. Ignace was built at Detroit with the purpose of effecting a passage through the ice. The St. Ignace is a double-ended steamer, having a heavy propeller, driven by an independent engine, at the bow, in addition to the usual one astern. She was completed late in March last, and immediately left for Mackinac. On Lake Huron she encountered 250 miles of ice, averaging about 2ft. in thickness, but in places piled up to a depth of 10ft. This was passed through without any trouble, and was welcomed on arriving at her destination by almost the entire population, who came out on the ice to meet her on sleighs. Her first hard task consisted in reaching her wharf at Mackinac City. The ice had piled up and frozen solid for a distance of 1,000ft. out from the end of the wharf. The outer face of the mass was 20ft. deep. It rested on the bottom of the harbour all the way out, and extended 5ft. to 6ft. above the water level. Her bow was shoved against the ice, and both propellers set in motion. The forward propeller barrowed into the ice, loosening the pieces and sending them aft, where they came under the influence of the suction of the stern propeller, and were forced astern. After one hour's steady work the St. Ignace had torn a channel for herself and reached the wharf. A correspondent of THE EXAMINER thinks that a steamer like the St. Ignace could be used for winter crossing between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland.

National Righteousness is the title of a periodical published by Morgan and Scott, London, England. It is an attack really on national unrighteousness and goes for our national sins with bare knuckles. The opium traffic of India, and the drink traffic of Africa are terrible exposures, in the number under notice, but whether the opinions of the most able writers can be made to outweigh the craft and cunning of the greedy selfishness that pervades the world is quite another question.

William Bryce, publisher, Toronto, has issued a reprint, for twenty-five cents, of Emanuel Swedenborg's "Heaven and Hell." It was written nearly a century and a half ago, and has remained a text book to all that see's followers ever since. It is a logical statement and quite clear as to meaning, but it does not therefore follow that it is convincing to any, (as he says) who have not the affection of truth, for the sake of truth. The central point of all Swedenborgian writings is that The Lord, is The God of Heaven, and the system one of universal correspondence. Swedenborg's ideas about Heaven and Hell are worthy a thoughtful perusal.

Ross Wood, or the Octoroon's Bride, by Jean Fairweather, is from the press of J. T. Robinson, of Montreal, and is all sorts and sizes of joys and sorrows, but it ends all right. The Louisiana plantation got restored to its former glory, and "all went merry as a marriage bell."

Wm. Bryce's No. 122 of his Home Series of novels is called "Le Docteur Rameau, or a Broken Life." The pieces are made up of love and marriage, shattered links, separations, tragedy, losses and gains, betrothals, discoveries, revelations, and finally, which acts like LePage's glue, the triumph of love. There are some good ideas in it, some fairly well told, but it is not conspicuous for originality.

One Mistake, a Manitoban reminiscence, by Zero, has a good many hidden lessons of life and love experiences; but there is more than "one mistake" in it. It is not priced, dated nor shown who has ventured to publish it, but it may probably be heard of at the Department of Agriculture. It was issued last year.

Publisher Robinson, of Montreal issued a detective story with the title of "Silken Threads." It is a hard story about three blasted lives, as the consequence of a woman's not listening to the dictates of her own heart.

Mr. Naylan's Family Circle is another of Mr. Robinson's publications. It is quite worth the 25 cts. asked for it, but such expressions as "the two eldest brothers," whom it would bother a Philadelphia lawyer to imagine more than one, indicates defective thinking, which is otherwise conspicuous in the story.

The Sheppard Publishing Company, of Toronto, has sent out a very readable volume by Edmund E. Sheppard, entitled, A Bad Man's Sweetheart. It is the old story of love and disappointed hope, at
