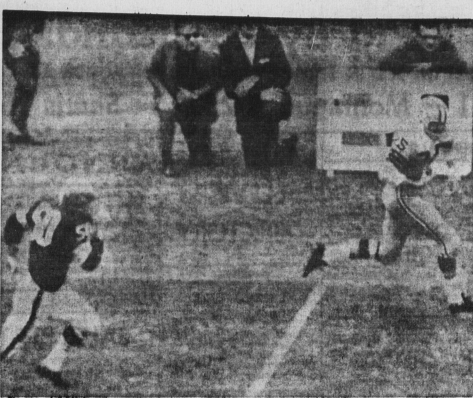
## Minor Players Enjoy Hockey

## Carl McQuaid Is Great As Packers Nip Students 2-1

The Vince-Mulligan coached Packers defeated brother Billy's Students 2-1, in minor hockey's "Game of the Week" played Saturday evening at the Charlottetown Forum. This was easily the best-played game of the year between these Juvenile-Midget teams. The goalies, Carl McQuaid of the Packers and John Reid of the students, were sensational, particularly McQuaid who made 26 stops. Cyril MacDonald gave the students a 1-0 lead at the 10:20 mark of the first period when his close-in drive trickled over the goal line after McQuaid made the initial save. This was the only goal of the first period, which saw both goalies come up with eight saves apiece.

There was no scoring in the second period although the students had some great chances to score. At the 9:32 mark of the second period John Reid of the Packers was sent off for holding and it was here, where the Students had their best chance to score. Jack McEachern broke in alone on McQuaid and fired a blistering 30 footer that missed the left corner of the net. The students stored back and seconds later Alan Flood broke in alone only to have his close in drive miss the right corner by inches. McQuaid made 10 stops and Reid, 6. The Students maintained their slim 1-0 lead.

Bill Weatherbie tied the game up, 1-1, when he fired a close in drive through Reid's pads after taking a goalmouth pass from Gus Houston. Weatherbie was the hero of the game as he scored on a scramble in front of Reid at the 10:00 mark of the final period, to give the Packers a 2-1 lead.

With a little over a minute left the students coach, Billy Mulligan, pulled out Reid and inserted an extra forward. With seconds remaining Dennis Affleck had a clear shot at the open net but his shot was wiped out by the goalie.

Weatherbie was the offensive star of the game with two big goals. Wayne McDougall was easily the best defensive player on the ice, as time and again he broke up the Students' offensive attack. Carl McQuaid and John Reid were sensational and the game itself was the best seen at the Forum this year.

# Winipeg's Clark Is Winner As Cameron Comes Fourth

TORONTO (CP)—It took Norm Houck and his Winnipeg crew almost a year to get revenge for a defeat in last year's Canadian Curling Championship. The Houck's skipped rink, which lost a shot at the 1963 Canadian title in a semi-final playoff after being tied for first place with the Richardsons of Regina and the Hector Gervais foursome from Edmonton, captured the Tournament of Champions tonight at Maple Leaf Gardens Saturday.

Tied with Gervais at five wins and a loss, Houck soared to a 12-5 victory over the Alberta squad in the final round. Houck overpowered the world champion Ernie Richardson 14-7 in the second round of the tournament Wednesday. "This is a great personal victory for me," the 29-year-old Winnipeg high school teacher said as he clinched the Cur-Master Trophy.

Houck and his risk of Jim Ussel, Morley Handford and Ross Murdoch took their only game in an 8-7 squeaker. There Doug Cameron's Charlottetown rink, Cameron, although losing his first four games came back strong to win the next three. There were two disappointments at the first Tournament of Champions — the sparse crowds and the Richardsons. Skip Ernie, his brother Garnet and cousin Arno, and his son, took their first game 14-7 to Gervais and second 10-6 to Edmonton Gervais.

Big Procter Gervais held down second place in the final standing with two losses in seven games. His other defeat was a 14-7 trouncing by Mann in the third round. About 1,000 persons watched Saturday's final round, bringing the total attendance for the four-day tournament to less than 10,000.

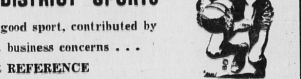
